# **HOW YOU CAN HELP**

Both mumma and baby turtles are vulnerable to beach disturbances and disorientation from artificial lights. They can't change their behaviour, so it's up to us to help maximise nesting success and hatchling survival.

We encourage you to stay off the local beaches after dark. Local research volunteers have been trained to minimise their impact on nesting turtles however any activity on the beach at night will have a detrimental impact on turtle nesting and hatching.



### Help Numbers Grow

#### IF YOU DO SEE A TURTLE ON OUR BEACHES:

- Keep your distance, turn off any lights and don't move.
- Do not take photos of the turtle/s with flash.
- Do not walk or stand in front of the turtle/s.
- Do not use any light source while on the beach.
- Do not touch the turtle.

## Cutting the Glow

## FROM 7:30 PM DURING OCTOBER TO APRIL YOU CAN HELP CUT THE GLOW BY:

- Turning off unnecessary lighting in your accommodation at night
- Closing curtains and blinds to reduce light emissions
- When driving, avoiding using high beam near beaches where possible
- Do not use any light source while on the beach
