Markets, dogs, and food galore

THE Riverland Rose and Garden Festival's popular Festival Fair is back, with organisers expecting a stronger contingent of stallholders compared to last year.

The fair will kick off the festival on Saturday, October 16, from 9am to 3pm, at the Jarrett Memorial Gardens.

Around 40 stalls will be on offer, showcasing a range of produce, nuts and fruit, giftware, entertainment, service clubs, SES, CFS, garden supplies, plants, confectionary, handicrafts, wood and metal work, clothing, food and coffee, dried fruits, sauces and jams and other bric-a-brac – and a woodworking display.

Organisers expect a stronger showing from stallholders due to the return of Victorians, depending on Covid-19 restrictions.

Around eight food stalls are expected at the event, and sit-down areas will be available to attendees.

The committee has allocated 12 seating areas interspersed with the food stalls (a Covid-19 requirement).

Every stallholder who sells food will have a Covid Safe Plan at their stall provided by the committee. No alcohol will be served at the event.

After a popular debut at last year's event, the dog agility display will return for this year's Festival Fair.

Sue Laidler from the Riverland Dog Training & Kennel Club put on a "fantastic display", which is expected to be a hit again this year.

The peg race between dogs and children was particularly popular, where Sue's dogs compete with children from the crowd to retrieve pegs.

Last year, somewhat surprisingly, in most cases the children won.

This year the committee will try to make the display more user friendly with more seating and a sign telling patrons when the next display will be run.

Jarrett Memorial Gardens will be fenced off again this year, due to Covid-19 restrictions, with the one entrance gate from James Avenue.

Clear signage on rules of entry and Covid-19 regulations will be on display at the entrance, together with hand sanitizer and Covid-19 forms and QR barcodes.

Patrons with dogs will be allowed entrance with their dog kept on a leash.

The committee is still accepting registrations to this year's fair from across the border and locally.



The spokesperson thanked local gardeners for their help and contribution of flowers and foliage.

"It's a big undertaking and such a big job for our team of organisers but it really is worth it," they said.

This year's display will be about showcasing the festival inclusivity and celebrating the push to make the festival a Riverland-wide event.

I've always enjoyed gardening and in 1996 I bought 1.5 acres of land and began my own garden. I cleared away the weeds, the peppercorn trees and the old ruins, but kept some Mallee and cattle bush trees and a kurrajong tree as a link to the past. My garden has five different areas that merge into each other. On the northern side there are natives including grevilleas, bottle brushes, banksias, quandongs, Mallee trees and cattle bushes. The driveway island features palms, roses, lawn, shrubs and golden elms. At the front of the house above a bluestone retaining wall are ornamental pear and plum trees and grasses. At the western end of the house is an area that I call "The Park". It has a lot of lawn and shady trees including Chinese elm, oak, plane, and kurrajong trees. It is an oasis of coolness on hot summer days, and the birds love it! Along the top of the block behind the house there is an orchard area of citrus and stone fruit trees, as well as pear and apple

trees. There are also avocado, macadamia and

Vision, passion and energy are what Graham

and Glenys Matthews share as they continue to build their gardens in Barmera. From a clean page in December, 2017, they have started their journey towards a wonderland that will be Nookamka Gardens. Opening their gardens for the first time in 2019, visitors were in awe at what had been achieved in only two years. Established then were the floodplain and fence line native gardens as well as a protea/leucadendron/ kangaroo paw garden. At the front of the house is a formal garden surrounded by standard roses and cottage garden with a wisteria arbour over the pathway. A comprehensive cottage garden borders the manicured lawn, with screen and a smaller garden blocking out the irrigation system and rainwater tanks. There are an assortment of floribunda and hybrid tea roses interplanted with many special bearded irises in another room. Up on the next level is a large orchid shade house and smaller soft plant shade house. At the back of the house frangipani. magnolia and camellia are interplanted with salvia and smaller shrubs. At the eastern end of the house more camellias with tree magnolia are established among another cottage garden. Since that first open day in 2019 much planning and further development has taken place. Room has been made for a few aviaries around the gardens to appease Graham's other passion, birds. Over 50 tonnes of large rocks have been brought in for terracing along with 250 tonne of red sand topsoil to provide elevation and character for the various rooms to be established. Some of these have been allocated plantings while others are still to be decided. This will be a work in progress for another year or so, but as we all know a gardener's work is never done. Plants will be available for purchase from Grandma's Plant Table'

"For example, natives are flowering now but come spring, our roses will be in full-bloom."


Mrs Santos said the garden will be open both weekends of the festival.

History of the lestimate

FOR 27 years, rose enthusiasts have travelled to Renmark in October to celebrate the town in full bloom.

The idea for the Renmark Rose Festival grew from Eithne Sidhu's desire to bring people into the region and to promote Renmark as the rose capital of Australia.

Eithne collaborated with rosarian David Ruston to run the very first 'Rose Week' in 1994. Festival patrons can visit her memorial garden in the Jarrett Gardens in James Avenue.



The Renmark Rose Festival really burst onto the scene in 1995.

It instantly gained attention from thousands of rose and garden lovers and was a success from its debut.

The festival's inaugural chairperson, Eithne Sidhu, told the Murray Pioneer in 1995 that the festival had been embraced by the local community, with businesses decorating their storefronts with a rose-inspired theme.

The festival, in its infancy, was run by the Renmark Chamber of Commerce.

The debut festival started with a bang with a night of glitz and glam taking place at the Rose Ball, hosted by the Renmark Hotel.

Another highlight was the open day at David Ruston's 14-hectare rose

In 1996, the festival was again well attended, with around 1000 people flocking to the official opening at Ruston's Rose Garden.

The event was opened by past

president of The Rose Society of South Australia, Walter Duncan

The big part of the festival's success was attributed to the open garden program, which was popular amongst attendees.

Open gardeners were also given various prizes for their spectacular properties.

In 1997, the Renmark Rose Festival was officially opened by Renmark Paringa Mayor Rod Thomas at Ruston's

A strong contingent of locals opened their gardens again to help showcase the town's wonderful gardens.

The event concluded at the Opera in the Winery at Angove Family Winemakers.

In 1998, Renmark Rose Festival organisers braced themselves for their biggest crowd yet, as the popularity and fixture of events continued to

David Ruston told the Pioneer before the 1998 event that his garden was "in perfect shape".

His 50,000-plus rose bushes were one of the biggest highlights of the festival.

The Renmark Institute's floral display had also grown in popularity and prominence since the event's debut.

The committee told the Pioneer the festival attracted up to 10,000 people throughout the festival, with accommodation providers packed to the brim.

In 1999, the festival continued to grow in popularity and reputation, with David Ruston noting the increase of locals planting roses in their gardens to showcase roses in the Riverland.

An impressive 22 gardens were entered in the open garden program and were judged by Walter Duncan and Renmark Rose Festival garden competition co-ordinator Jill Knight



In 2000, David Ruston's extraordinary garden continued to be one of the main attractions of the festival, with dozens of coaches visiting the popular location.

More than 600 people attended the official opening, while thousands visited the region for the week-long festival.

The festival was launched by Mr Ruston's niece Anne Ruston, who was the chief executive officer of the National Wine Centre in Adelaide, at the time.

Mr Ruston and 40 volunteers picked 10,000 roses to feature in the Renmark Institute for the One Thousand Years of Roses display.

The display is one of the highlights of the festival and featured roses set out in chronological order.



The 2001 event introduced a new occasion – the Jazz, Wine and Roses Night held at the Olivewood Museum.

Despite some challenging weather, a strong attendance still flocked to Renmark for the sixth festival, which continued to gain attention from all over the country.

In 2002, the festival was again opened in David Ruston's rose garden, with the 50,000-plus rose bush garden continuing to wow visitors.

The Jazz, Wine and Roses night featured again, while more and more events continued to pop up as the festival grew in popularity.

The Renmark Institute's Year of the Outback was seen by approximately 1000 people, while hundreds of people were recorded visiting the open gardens.



In 2003, the festival continued to showcase arts and culture with the Festival of Music and Dance taking place.

The evening featured a range of Riverland artists and musicians at the Chaffey Theatre.

The inaugural Rose Run was held at the Renmark river front on the closing weekend of the festival.

The normally-popular Renmark Institute display was unfortunately cancelled due to a late rose season meaning the committee couldn't access roses for the display.

However, the cancellation of the display failed to impact the popularity of the remainder of the festival.



In 2004, the committee geared up to celebrate the festival's 10-year anniversary.

The open garden continued its popularity, with Cooltong couple Deirdre and Frank Albanese taking Grand Champion Garden award but also the best garden over a quarteracre section and the best display of annuals.

The 2005 festival marked the opening of Ruston's Roses new visitor centre and historic car museum.

Ruston's Roses would become a hub

for the festival for years to come.

The annual Rose Run became a popular fixture of the festival, with 40 runners taking place in the race.

The Renmark Institute's Roses Around the World display attracted hundreds of people eager to see the extravagant display.

In 2006, the number of open gardens was still strong despite hot and windy conditions in the lead-up to the festival.

Organisers said the conditions threatened to impact the quality of the gardens, but luckily the gardens still presented well.

Local students got involved in the festival with an art competition held between the Renmark primary schools.

In 2007, the Renmark Rose Festival committee continued to introduce new events to continue to attract visitors to the region.

Despite being booked for 150 people, over 300 attended the launch of Rose Week's inaugural sculpture exhibition at Ruston's Rose Garden.

A popular champagne bus tour was also launched, while the annual Rose Run was cancelled due to extreme heat.



In 2008, Renmark Rose Festival president said a strong contingent of interstate visitors attended the event, with people from Western Australia, Queensland and Victoria in attendance.

The Renmark Institute's Produce of the Riverland shone a spotlight on local

Organisers said a record number of people attended the 2008 event.



In 2009, the festival ran over 10 days, with a number of new events making their way into the program.

The festival opening took place in the Jarrett Memorial Gardens and encompassed a "carnival atmosphere"according to festival president Helen Slade.

Organisers hailed the festival's success and noted the presence of attendees from overseas.



In 2010, due to an extremely cold winter, organisers were forced to buy in roses to set up the Renmark Institute display.

Despite the weather, David Ruston told the Pioneer the roses around the town would be spectacular in time for the festival.

The festival continued with its opening fair in the Jarrett Memorial Gardens, which featured over 30 stalls.

The iconic David Ruston Statue was unveiled at the opening in front of hundreds of attendees.



During the 2011 festival, the committee launched its very own rose species, which is suited to grow well in the Riverland climate.

The festival continued to gain national attention with popular television program Better Homes and Gardens featuring the event on its show.

The Riverland Youth Theatre participated in the Renmark Institute display to inject some vibrancy into the exhibition.

RYT's young drama students dressed up as different fairy tales and nursery rhymes to fit in with the display's Once Upon a Time theme.

In 2012, the Renmark Rose Festival boasted 14 new attractions, including candlelit suppers at Olivewood Museum, a Splash Paint art group display at Ruston's Roses and a Renmark Plaza fashion parade.

The festival's opening fair was again deemed a highlight of the event with more than 30 food and craft stalls and entertainment including performances from Rosie Clark's School of

Ballet and Tap, featuring on the day. The successful festival concluded with a Light the Night fundraising event for the Starlight Foundation.



The Renmark Rose Festival continued to grow in 2013, with 30 attractions and 24 open gardens on offer.

The Festival Fair boasted more than 40 stalls and was a massive highlight.

The Renmark Institute display was again a major attraction for visitors with the theme of 'Flowers Through the Ages' wowing attendees.

The Renmark High School held its Spring Carnival in conjunction with the festival, while the Rose Festival Art Trail began to gain traction.

In 2014, the festival was opened by Andrew 'Cosi' Costello to help kick the event off with a bang.

The inaugural Black and White Ball made its debut at Ruston's Roses to add some glitz and glam to the week, while attendees were spoilt with over 20 open gardens on offer to visit.

The 2015 festival saw the launch of the Ambassador Program to help encourage younger people to get involved in the event.

Stephanie Coughlin, Reeni Leuders, April Webb, Bree Bitomsky and Casey Cocks were the inaugural ambassadors.

The young women hosted events throughout the festival and raised money for charity.

The ambassadors' efforts were celebrated at a dinner held under the stars along the Renmark river front.

The Governor of South Australia Hieu Van Le opened the festival.

In 2016, the town of Renmark looked especially rosie with local business owner and artist Jenny Richards painting roses on store fronts.

A special lights display was cast

onto the Ozone Theatre on Murray Avenue for the second year to create an interesting spectacle at night.

A new batch of ambassadors supported the festival once again and were also celebrated at the Gala Dinner on the river front.

President of the World Federation of Rose Societies and former Renmark man, Kelvin Trimper, officially opened the event at the Festival Fair, where an impressive 55 stalls were located.

In 2017, the festival was officially opened by Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone, at the Festival Fair.

The festival continued to climb in popularity, with the Renmark Institute display, in particular, proving a fan

A strong contingent of visitors from all over the state and country were again noted.

Several new gardens from Berri and an even a garden in Winkie featured in the open garden program.

In 2018, the festival experienced a bumper year with open gardens, boasting over 30 gardens to visit from Renmark, Paringa, Berri, Glossop, Monash, Loxton, Waikerie and Ramco.

The Gala Dinner was again a popular aspect of the event, while The Pines in Loxton held its inaugural Garden Fair.

During the 2019 festival, Rustons was reopened, thanks to its new owners, after being closed for some

The Gala Dinner was held at the iconic venue and celebrated the 2019

The Renmark Institute display and the open gardens were again the talk of the festival, with both fixtures proving popular over many years.

In 2020, the festival was re-named the Renmark Riverland Rose Festival to help transition the event as a regionwide festival.

Unfortunately, the organising committee had Covid-19 to contend with which made the planning process extremely difficult for those involved.

Despite the challenges that Covid-19 presented, the committee still forged ahead to hold a strong festival.



Craig prepares for open garden debut

A RIVERLAND man is this year set to fulfil a long-term ambition of showcasing his garden as part of an iconic annual festival

Barmera man Craig Rogers will this year hold his first open garden as part of this years' Riverland Rose and Garden Festival.

Mr Rogers said he decided to participate in the festival following encouragement from fellow gardening enthusiasts.

"The Riverland Garden Club had a meeting here and the day was really beautiful when they came," Mr Rogers said.

"They just loved it. I said to Murray Kemp that I didn't know if I was ready for an open garden, but he said I definitely was.

"They really encouraged me." Mr Rogers said his garden was divided into five areas, with each highlighting a different variety of

plants and flowers.
"I try and keep natives down the front," he said.

"Sometimes I like different structures... they're all similar colours but different shapes, and the pines add a bit of height.

"I'm no expert when it comes to picking plants. I tend to be the one who will drive around and see a plant I like, or that is growing pretty well in our area.

"I've got to find plants that are hardy, because the area can be so extreme. We can have 45C days and then down to minus zero temperatures. "Nothing is perfect and sometimes you plant something and it doesn't work... so you try something else."

Mr Rogers said his garden was often visited by various species of local wildlife and birds.

"We get the good old rabbit," he said.

"Quite often I've had kangaroos coming up the driveway. They've tipped over, and broken my birdbath before.

"It's shady, especially in the summertime, and I've got water going, so we've had them on the lawn before.

"It's quite peaceful just to listen to the birds. I've got quite a lot of blue wrens that come up and get amongst it."

Mr Rogers – who purchased the property when he was 21 – said the ongoing gardening process had provided a relaxing escape.

"When I first bought the property there used to be an old concrete foundation and a pickers' quarters," he said.

"I mainly started with natives around the edges, because I knew it was quite windy here and I needed that protection, and for privacy from the road.

"I planted an oleander hedge along the side that comes out with massive white flowers.

"In the summertime it's beautiful, because the sun goes straight overhead and in the hot afternoons it's all shaded and really nice and cool."

Pidge and Angie's garden a

labour of love

PIDGE and Angie Sandford have spent years perfecting and expanding their diverse garden, which will be on display as one of this year's Riverland Rose and Garden Festival open gardens.

The garden, set on an acre at the couple's Renmark North home, includes 240 rose bushes of all different colours, salvias, daisies, irises, princess lilies, and other flowering plants, plus two shadehouse areas, fruit trees and a vegetable patch.

"It's her garden but I mow the lawn and do all the weeding and Angie prunes all the fruit trees and the roses," Mr Sandford said.

"We've got 49 varieties of fruit in the garden – we have fruit trees and a few different varieties of grape vines.

"In the next four or five years we are going to be self-sufficient with fruit, plus we've got the garden." Mrs Sandford said the couple

had always enjoyed gardening.
"Both our mums had nice rose
gardens, and I've always really liked

my roses," she said.
"Then we extended the garden

out, but he wanted his fruit trees so we've both compromised."

The garden has been a labour of love for the Sandfords, who have spent countless hours planting, pruning, weeding and reshaping their backyard.

"I've done most of the things around here myself," Mr Sandford said.

"When we bought the house there was a rain water tank where the shade house is... so I knocked it all out and I redid all the decking and I slowly did it.

"There also used to be a pool which we got rid of and filled in, and now we have roses where that used to be."

Mr Sandford also created many of the sculptures dotted throughout the garden in his shed, with most made out of recycled metal from gas bottles, car axles and everything in between.

"Angie laughs at me for some of the things I make, and sometimes I don't know if that's bad or good," he said.

Despite her love of the veggie patch, Mrs Sandford still said the roses were her favourite part of the garden, while Mr Sandford liked the two shade houses.

"When we moved in, next door had all these bottlebrushes and nothing was growing on the ground," he said.

"So, I said to Angie we'd build a shade house and we had a think about what we could do.

"We ended up lining it with plastic, putting rocks on it and growing bromeliads because they only have small roots.

"The other shade house took me a couple of weeks with Angie giving me a hand to do it, and we slowly but surely got through it."

Mr Sandford said the couple had spent a lot of their spare time working in the garden.

"Before, me and Angie were both working at AgriExchange and then she would go and work at Woolworths at night times," he said.

"Then we'd come home on the weekend and we'd both be tired but we'd still get out in the garden.

"There were weeks we'd go to all these places and spend no less than \$160 on plants."

Mr Sandford said he was looking forward to taking part in the Rose Festival.

"We've done it for probably the last four or five years and we've quite enjoyed it," he said.

"I make some sculptures and sell them and we get almonds or make chutneys and sell them.

"We had David Ruston out here when he was alive and he asked Angie who was pruning the roses.

"She told him it was me and that I'd gone pretty hard, but he said that would never hurt them."

"But Angie prunes them now – she doesn't let me touch them.

Mr Sandford said he hoped the open gardens would avoid the impacts of Covid-19 restrictions. "With Covid we may have to

have masks and contact tracing and things like that," he said.

"I have we don't have to work."

"I hope we don't have to worry about that at the time but if we do it's going to be a bit of a headache to monitor all that.

"But we're very excited to have people coming through, we've had buses come through before."

Pidge and Angie will open their garden at 178 Eighth Street, Renmark North, from Saturday, October 16, to Saturday, October 23.

THE World Federation of Rose Societies (WFRS) is a Federation of the National Rose Societies of 41 member countries, representing rose enthusiasts around the world

The WFRS was founded in 1968 in England, and initially included Australia, Belgium, Israel, New Zealand, Romania, South Africa, Great Britain and the United States of America as founding Members. The original founders were soon joined by Canada, India, Japan and Switzerland. The newest member country is South Korea, joining in 2018.

The late Baroness Lily de Gerlache de Gomery, who was then president of the Belgium Rose Society, was a key promoter and campaigner in the formation of the WFRS and it was her belief that it should be a worldwide organisation. After being established, she was elected its first President in

The late David Ruston OAM of Renmark served as president of the WFRS from 1991 to 1994. At the WFRS World Rose Convention in 2009 the highest award bestowed by the Federation, The President Emeritus Award, was presented to David Ruston for his life-long passion, service and dedication in a variety of roles. David served in this role until

Kelvin Trimper AM, who was born and grew up in Renmark was President from 2015 to 2018.

The main goal of the WFRS is to expand contact among rose lovers and increase the flow of knowledge about the rose.

The Federation established these objectives:

- To encourage and facilitate the interchange of information about and knowledge of the rose between national rose societies
- To coordinate the holding of

international conventions and

- To encourage, and where appropriate, sponsor research into problems concerning the
- To establish common standards for judging rose seedlings.
- To assist in coordinating the registration of rose names.
- To establish a uniform system of rose classification.
- To grant international honours and awards To encourage and advance
- international cooperation on all matters concerning the

International Conventions and

TIME FOR NEW SEASON'S **ROSES and PLANTING ROSES**

The 2021 BARE ROOT ROSE season is open and roses are selling fast! You can easily order roses online or over the phone from specialist rose nurseries. The Rose Society of S.A. recommends Wagner's Rose Nursery, Knight's Roses and Newman's Nursery in S.A. and Treloar Roses in Victoria.

Here are my tips to get the very best out of your new roses, including preparation

- 1. Choose an area in the garden which receives at least 5 to 6 hours of direct sunlight each day and is free of tree and shrub root competition. Full sun is rec-
- 2. The soil should have reasonable drainage and contain lots of organic material. As some of our soils have a heavy clay content and often are alkaline (limestone), gypsum, compost and natural manures should be worked into the soil to improve its quality. Roses prefer a rich, loamy soil. Neutrog's Whoflungdung and GoGo Juice are excellent compost/ mulch and soil improvers to add at this
 - If preparing a new bed, work should commence on improving the soil at least 2 to 3 months prior to planting roses Winter is the best time to plant barerooted roses or relocate a rose in your garden. Roses have a short dormancy period in Australia and June, July and early August are ideal months to plant
- 3. Place any stakes and structures before planting roses.
- 4. PLANTING BARE ROOT ROSES Specialist rose nurseries and good garden centres have excellent stocks of bare rooted roses in June and early July. Bare root roses are also cheaper than roses in pots. I prefer planting bare rooted roses as they quickly settle into their new homes and soils. Once growing well,

sturdy new canes will grow from the bud union area. This compares with potted roses whose potting medium maybe very different to the soil profile in your garden

Once home, remove the bare root rose from its bag, shake off any sawdust or other product and soak it in a full bucket of water for at least 6 hours or overnight if possible. You can add either Neutrog Liquid Seamungus or Neutrog GoGo Juice to the water, while the rose is soaking. Dig a square hole at least 30cm square and deep. To assist the new rose, place a small handful of Neutrog Seamungus pellets in the hole and cover with 2 cms of soil.

Trim or remove any broken or damaged roots. Broken roots can result in suckers (root stock) which can rapidly dominate. Position your rose in the hole so that the bud union (woody knob in stem where the branches emerge) is approximately 1 to 2 cm above the natural soil level Observe where the roots fan out from the base of the plant. At this stage, I always remove the plant label from the plant. The label's tie can quickly strangle a young plant as it grows. Remove the plant and create a mound

(inverted cone of soil) in the hole such that when you place the rose back into the hole (at the correct depth) the base of the rose stem rests on top of the mound and its roots can be "fanned out" as evenly as possible from the shank of the plant. Back fill hole to approx. half full and fill the hole with a bucket of water. You can gently wriggle the rose to remove any air pockets.

Wait until the water drains away, backfill the hole to the natural soil level. The height at which the rose is planted is very important. The bud union should be only slightly (1 to 2 cm) above the level of the soil.

Finally, you can mulch the rose after it has started to grow, or 2 to 3 months after planting, with a quality product (I use Neutrog Whoflungdung), and at completion; the bud union should be at the level of the top of the mulch. Mulching will improve growth by conserving water, keeping roots cool and restricting weed growth and break down to give nutritional benefit. The Rose Society of SA recommends Neutrog's Whoflungdung -a biologically activated, nutrient rich, weed free, absorbent, super mulch.

Watering. It takes about 6 – 8 weeks for new roses to become established, therefore do not let the soil dry out com-

PEOPLE have rediscovered the joy of cultivating beautiful gardens and growing gorgeous roses. It's peaceful and therapeutic strolling around a rose garden and very rewarding picking a bunch of your home-grown roses to take

Pruning is not a difficult task if you use the right equipment and follow a few simple rules. In South Australia I recommend pruning in July. Avoid the temptation to prune too early.

Wear old clothes including a longsleeved shirt, jeans or coveralls, sturdy footwear, a brimmed hat and preferably eye protection. Wear all leather gloves, preferably gauntlets

You need a good pair of bi-pass secateurs, like Felco. Find the right size to suit your hand, good quality loppers and a pruning saw. Make sure your tools are sharp.



When you approach the bush, don't bother looking at the top third to half - this will be removed. Focus on the bottom half of the plant. Ideally, you want to retain strong, healthy, young canes and remove all dead wood, weak twiggy growth and weak branches. If sufficient new canes have grown from the base (water shoots), then you can remove old canes from the base. Also remove canes crossing over into the centre of the plant. Ultimately, you want the rose bush to resemble a cup shape, free of growth in the middle. The outer rim canes should be reduced to onethird to half of their original height and cut to 3mm above an outwardly facing bud (eye). Remove all leaves.

Leave approximately six to eight canes growing from the base which is adequate and two to three side canes, these can be cut back to show three or four healthy buds.

All old foliage should be removed and old fallen leaves and pruning remnants collected and placed into green waste. Once finished, a winter spray should be

applied liberally – use pest oil, winter oil or lime Sulphur. This will kill overwintering aphids and spider mite eggs and fungal spores which reside in cracks and crevasses on the stems or around prickles. Spray the stems and the ground underneath the bush.



3-Year-Old Hybrid Tea pruned

For a typical established Hybrid Tea or Floribunda rose bush focus on the bottom half of the plant. To remove an old cane cut it flush at the base.

Remove all dead wood, twiggy growth and weak branches and leave the young canes. Use a pruning saw for cuts over 2 ½ cm and for removing old canes from the base.

Ideally cut at a 45-degree angle and about 7mm above bud eye. Choose an outward facing bud. The bud eye was where foliage was attached.



cane showing correct cut and bud. Within a few weeks the dormant bud eye will begin to swell. In another three weeks the swelling will result in a young new stem.

PESTS AND DISEASES

As rose shoots get to 15cm in length apply preventative fungicides to avoid bad infestations of black spot, rust and mildew. A couple of sprays, a fortnight apart, mid to late September and early October may be required. Avoid using strong pesticides on aphids and grubs, instead try Organic oils such as Eco-Oil or Eco-Neem or one of the natural sprays (such as Natrasoap) to control bad infestations. You can also wash off Aphids with a spray of water.

The Rose Society recommends

MULCH

Neutrog's 'Whoflungdung' which is a certified organic mulch, biologically activated, nutrient rich and weed free. While it can be applied immediately around the base of mature roses (3 years and older) it is advised not to apply mulch closer than 15cms to new, one or two-year-old plants as sometimes damage can occur to young basal shoots. 'Whoflungdung' comes in convenient 20kg compressed bales. Apply water after application to settle the mulch in. Mulch significantly reduces evaporation, saving up to 40% - 50% of the irrigation otherwise required; it cools the root zone and introduces good microbial activity into the soil. The benefits of applying mulch include: -

- Weed suppression
- Reducing the amount of evaporation and watering needed
- The mulch breaks down and adds organic material into the soil
- The introduction of beneficial bacteria
- Encouraging earthworms that aerate the soil
- Regulates soil temperature Helps to prevent erosion from

heavy rain

ROSE CULTURE NOTES FOR AUGUST

- **1.** Finish rose pruning ensure you remove the old leaves from the plant and as many old loose leaves from around the plant as possible, as these contain bad fungal spores and insect eggs.
- **2.** Spray the roses with a winter dormant spray. I use Winter Oil, but you can also use lime sulphur. Importantly, you must saturate the plant until the spray runs off and also spray the ground around the plant.
- **3.** Fertilise with Neutrog Seamungus which conditions the soil and stimulates and supports root growth and development It is ideal for establishing new plants, particularly bare-rooted roses.
- **4.** Fertilise with Neutrog Sudden Impact for Roses when the new rose shoots are about 2 cms long.
- **5.** Mulch with 'WhoFlungDung' - the latest certified organic mulch product from Neutrog. It is a biologically activated, nutrient rich, weed free, absorbent super mulch.
- 6. New roses should be planted, if this has not been done already.
- 7. Sit back and enjoy the spring growth and await the spring flush of roses.


