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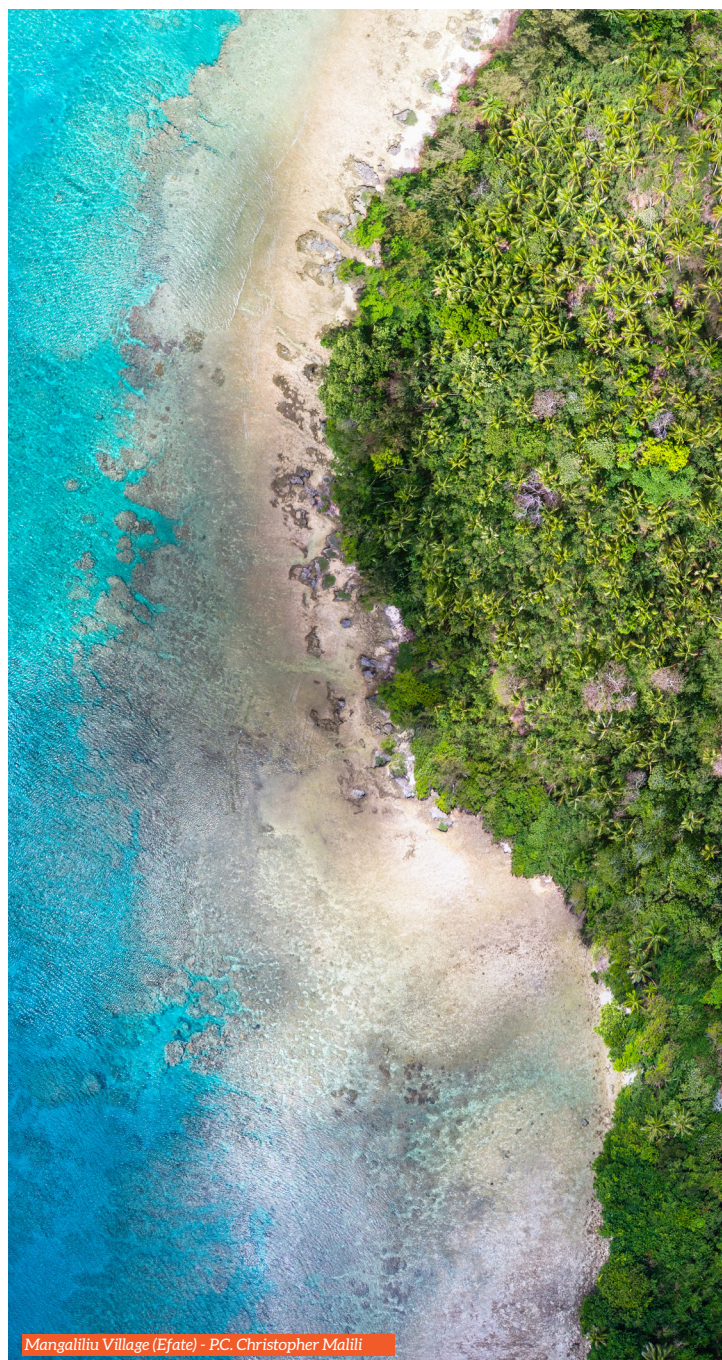

New Tanna Tours

Nusumetu Ecotourism Tour shows a side of Tanna not seen at the island's other attractions. It's an ecotour that combines a hike through old growth rainforests and a cultural tour about Tannese traditional botanical knowledge. It promotes the maintenance of traditional knowledge about endemic species of plants and animals and involves cultural displays from the people of Nusumetu. The full day tour costs Vt2,500 per person and includes refreshment and lunch, beautiful views, and visits to a historical site, waterfall, horse riding and kastom dance. To book, call 5417975.

DESTINATION MALAMPA

Located in the heart of our archipelago, Malampa offers the adventurous domestic traveller a South Pacific experience. Malampa province gets its name from the islands of Malekula (MAL), Ambrym (AM) and Paama (PA). The province also includes a number of smaller islands along the coast of Malekula and the uninhabited volcanic island of Lopevi.

1. MASKELYNE CANOE RACE AND FESTIVAL (27th-28th July)

The Maskelyne Canoe Race Festival is a three day event set in the stunning Maskelyne Islands. The Festival features numerous activities including canoe carving, communal cooking, kastom dancing, and of course the main event itself — the canoe races.

The event takes place every year from 26–28 of July in Peskarus village on Uluveo Island, just south of mainland Malekula, in the lead up to the national Independence celebrations on 30 July. Both men and women race across the water in the numerous heats held during the event.

How to get there

To get to the Maskelyne islands, flights can be booked through Air Vanuatu, Unity Airlines and Air Taxi to Lamap Airport and from there a 5-minute drive is required to reach Point Doucere, also known as Lamap Landing. From there, a short boat ride through the Maskelyne Sound will bring you to the small islands of the Maskelynes group.



Where to stay

There are three main accommodation options on the island including **Batis Bungalows** (Tel: 7751463) in Pellongk village, **Malog Bungalows** (Tel: 5343687) set on the water on Uluveo island and **Senelich Bungalows** (Tel: 5737011) with breathtaking views across to Ambrym's twin volcanoes. There are many great accommodation options on the mainland of Malekula as well, and a trip to the event by boat can be arranged through your accommodation hosts.

2. FEEL THE POWER OF AMBRYM'S FANLA ARTS FESTIVAL & THE MAGICAL ROM DANCE (18-20TH AUG)

The Fanla Arts Festival is held in the north of Ambrym island in Fanla village. It's an unique two day event that takes place in August each year. During the festival, many kastom dances and grade taking ceremonies are performed as well as magic shows, a circumcision ceremony and a delicious island feast.

The highlight of the event is undoubtedly the Rom Dance. Surrounded by tall towering tamtams in village nasara, the Rom Dance warriors are dressed to represent evil spirits and are adorned in thick cloaks of dried banana leaves and brightly painted head masks. Each part of the dance, each rhythmic step and chant, is a story, a myth, and history combined.

The dance is performed by the men of the village, and it is taboo for the Fanla women to witness, it's also a method of grade-taking to move up in the ranks of society. If a man wishes to ascend the village hierarchy he must purchase the design of a mask from the person who owns it with pigs and money, then spend time learning the rules that are part of the mask design as each design contains powerful magic.



The Rom masks are the stepping stones that allow a man to become a chief politically and socially, and are said to be so powerful that after each ceremony they are usually burnt to ensure that the spirits of the mask do not haunt the wearer afterwards.

This masked dance is a centuries-old ceremonial ritual that goes back in time and tells of the timeless tale of good versus evil. To witness these diverse tales passed down through dance alongside the beating of tamtams and shakers is a privilege and that would most certainly give you goosebumps and is one to tick off your Vanuatu bucket list.

The Rom or 'Masked' dance is also a distinct part of the Ambrym Magic Festival and is said to favourably influence the harvests. Visitors who are privileged to witness this sacred dance get an opportunity to be hypnotized by the costume dances as well as listen to the eerie and beautiful sound of the bamboo flute being played. Small displays of the mysterious 'black magic' are also performed by a 'man blong blak majik'.

In addition to the Rom dance, several special kastom dances are performed, including the Pilpilan kastom dance, the Namangi dance, the Roplar dance. Activities include traditional village tours, artisanal carving display and sale, sand drawing, string drawing, the unveiling of the Rom Mask and finally kava tasting with the chiefs.

Plunge back in time at Espiritu Santo's world-class diving sites

Espiritu Santo boasts some of the best diving sites in the world. This in fact is due to the interesting military history of the island, which is the cause for much of the development that we see in Santo today. Two of the most renowned diving sites in the world exist in just a stone's throw from Luganville, and are the legacy of the largest military bases to be constructed in the Pacific during World War 2.

1. USS PRESIDENT COOLIDGE

The USS President Coolidge was a luxury liner turned troop carrier. There were approximately 5,000 troops on board. After an error in communication, the Coolidge hit friendly mines at the entrance to Second Channel. Captain Henry Nelson, tried to run her aground and ordered the troops to disembark, thinking that they would be able to return the next day to salvage the ship's cargo.

However, Captain Nelson's attempt to ground the Coolidge was prevented by the coral reef, and SS President Coolidge turned on her side and slid down the slope into the channel, carrying with her all of the military equipment in her hold.

Today, the USS President Coolidge is considered to be one of the best wreck dives in the world due to the sheer size, intact interior and numerous items that were left behind by the troops. According to frequent divers, the Coolidge is filled with places to explore and there's something new to see on every single dive; even a week of diving the Coolidge is not enough to uncover all of the secrets of the former cruise liner.

2. MILLION DOLLAR POINT

In 1945, when the second world war was coming to an end, the US military began disassembling the US army base with the intention of selling some of the surplus military equipment and supplies to the local Condominium government at the price of 10 cents in the dollar.

However, the Franco-British government at the time refused to purchase the goods, thinking that they would be able to help themselves to it for free once the US military had left, knowing there was no way that the US ships could take every single piece of equipment back. Not intending to give anything away for free, the military chose to dump millions of dollars worth of assets into the sea. Today, this site became known as the Million Dollar Point.

Million Dollar point is a popular recreational site where divers can see sunken landing craft, jeeps, six-wheeler trucks, gigantic bulldozers, forklifts, semi-trailers, tractors, large bound sheets of corrugated iron, sealed boxes of clothing and of course the famous crates of Coca-Cola. Diving at the Million Dollar point is a must, because it allows divers to view an incredible mixture of sea life among the relics of Espiritu Santo's remarkable past.

3. MEET MAYUMI GREEN, AVID ADVENTURE SEEKER, LOVER OF NATURE & COMMUNITY LEADER

Founder of inbound adventure tour operator, Wrecks to Rainforest, Mayumi Green is a trailblazer in adventure tourism in Vanuatu, and an avid adventurer in her own right. She founded Wrecks to Rainforest to create tailor-made packages for adventurous travellers seeking to discover exciting experiences in remote parts of Vanuatu.

Mayumi's knowledge of Vanuatu and its people stems from her travels all over Tanna, Efate, Malekula, Pentecost, Ambrym, Motalava, Rah, Vanua Lava, Gaua, Torres islands, and in Espiritu Santo Island where she resides. Wrecks to Rainforest has enabled many small businesses and communities in remote places to gain income and experience from hosting adventure tourists from all over the world.

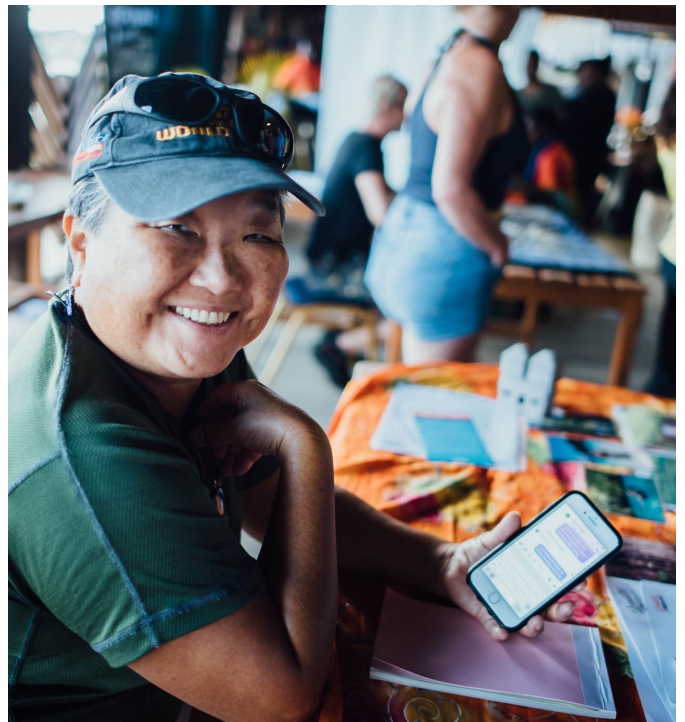
Mayumi Green first arrived in Vanuatu, in 1988 from Tokyo for what was meant to be a two day holiday. Her then boyfriend, Kevin, had just arrived from Australia to set up his Bokissa Island resort dive business. The pair had met in Brisbane and Mayumi had subsequently returned to Japan.

Mayumi was introduced to the owners of Bokissa Island Private Resort and received an on-the-spot job offer. Mayumi was asked to co-manage the resort with Kevin and they flew to Espiritu Santo the next day to find the resort hosting only the staff and two guests.

Coming from fast-paced Japan, Mayumi didn't quite know how she would cope living on a small island where the pace of life is much slower. However, as years went by, she learnt more of the Vanuatu way of life, the culture, nature and timelessness of the country.



At the Navaka river mouth, you will be treated to a picnic lunch on Ipayato beach before a cool off at the Taffuntari waterfall. The price for the full day including transfers, entrance fees and lunch is Vt50,600 per truck. Other tours that can be organized include, tour through the Millenium Cave Tour, a half-day (8am-12pm) tour to the Tuffuntari waterfall, Narango view, Tangoa Blacksand Beach and other sites, and a half-day tour to the Loru protected area. After managing the resort together for 29 months, the pair decided to run their diving business full-time as their business grew. Mayumi and Kevin married and lived on Bokissa for six years before moving to mainland Santo in 1994.

In 2005, inspired by explorer Glen Russel's story about the Lisepep who live in the jungles of northern Vanuatu, Mayumi started trekking into the jungle, to places few Ni-Vanuatu people have seen, let alone any overseas visitors. Having worked as an inbound tour operator for diving agents, Mayumi started her Wrecks to Rainforest tour business in 2008. Over the years, Mayumi has helped countless guests experience the best adventures Vanuatu has to offer, whether they are centred around nature, culture or people.

Currently Mayumi is focused on her Big Heart Island Vanuatu charity project with an aim to rebuild 40 kindergartens that were damaged last year by TC Harold. Each kindergarten is designed to be cyclone-proof and will cost two million vatu each. Mayumi's friends in various countries and here in Vanuatu have helped to raise Vt700,000 so far. PENTECOST NAGOL LAND DIVING FESTIVAL

The Nagol of south Pentecost ritual began from a tale of a woman who was running away from her husband, whose name was Tamalie. The woman ran until she came to a tall tree and climbed, and Tamalie quickly scaled the limbs of the tree after her. Once at the top, Tamalie's wife quickly tied vines around her ankles and waited for her husband to approach the top. When Tamalie approached the top, his wife quickly hurled herself off the tree, and Tamalie in anguish went after her and fell to his demise.

This tale inspired the first ceremony jumpers who were women, and that was halted when village elders deemed the ceremony to be too dangerous for women. Men then became the ceremonial jumpers to mark the start of the yam harvest and also as rites of passage for young men who after circumcision take part in this heart-stopping ceremony.

Each year, after successfully jumping from the lower platforms, the jumpers would progress onto the next level until they eventually get the opportunity to jump from the highest platform, which symbolizes a man's status as a jumper and social standing in the village.

The event, which occurs every year, takes place on Saturdays between April–June. It sees local men perform heart-stopping feats of diving head first off tall wooden towers up to 35 m. The very last jumper, who is usually the most experienced and skilled, would then close the ceremony by jumping off the top of the tower.

Walarua Guesthouse, Lavatu village located in north Pentecost, just a 15-minute drive from the airport and

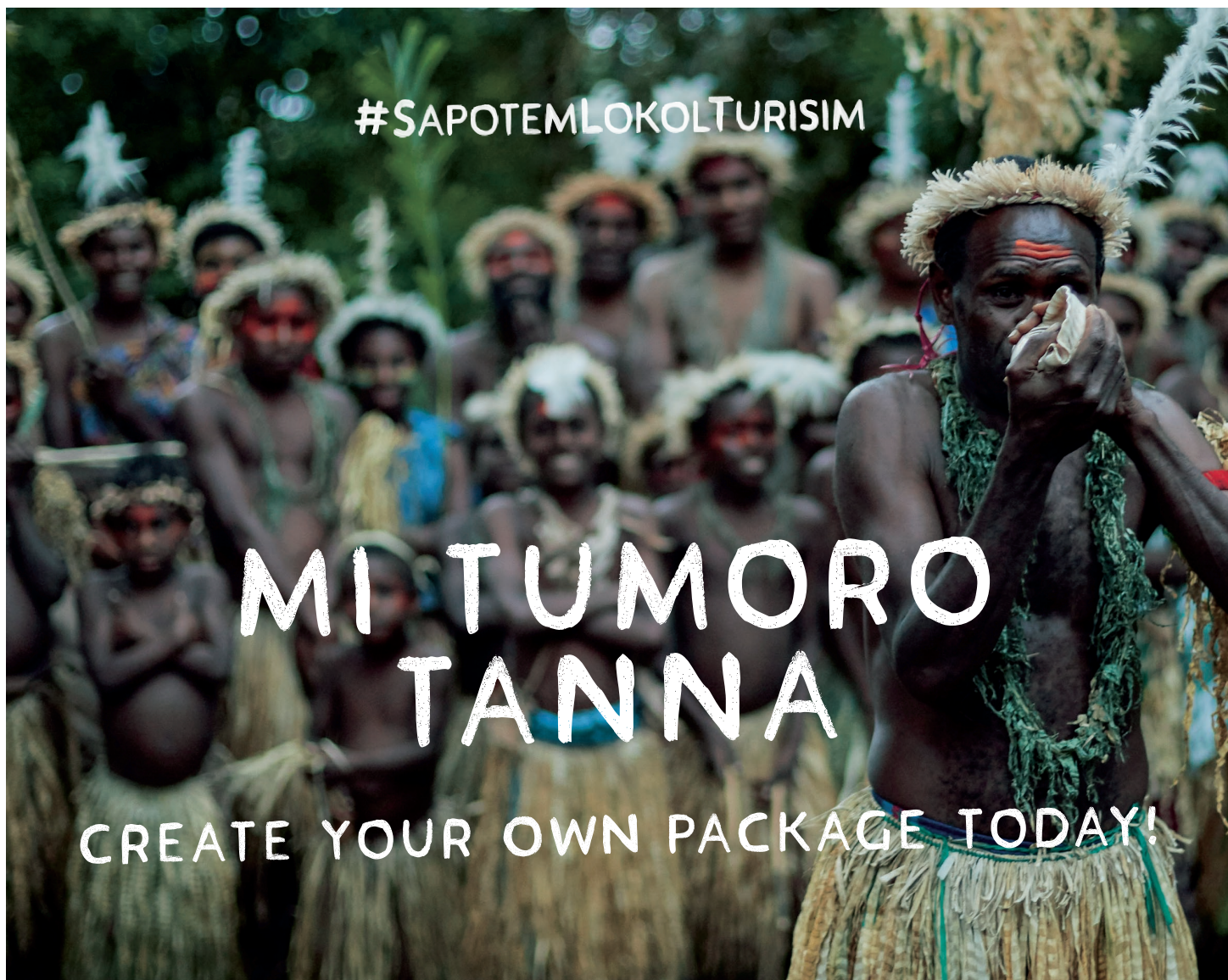

DESTINATION SHEFA



Shefa is one of the six provinces of Vanuatu, located in the center of the country. The province's name is derived from the initial letters of SHEpherd islands, Epi, and EFate which make up the province.

The Shefa Islands are volcanic, and limestone/raised reef in origin with one active volcano on Epi - only sporadically active, and other underwater and extinct volcanoes are scattered throughout the province.

With many great snorkelling spots, you can even sight endangered species such as turtles and dugongs near Erakor Island and marine sanctuaries.

Marine sanctuaries are popular to attempt preserving marine life around Shefa, although traditional methods of conservation have also been highly effective. This movement is also an effort to promote sustainable tourism through the Efate Land Management Area, the Nikaura Marine Protected Area on Epi, the Nguna-Pele Marine Protected Area Network at north Efate, and the Hideaway Marine Sanctuary at Hideaway Island.

MAKURA TOKOLAU

First formed in the 1970s, the Makura Tokolau stringband group hails from the island of Makira and is a veteran act on Vanuatu's music scene. Since their first album was recorded in the 1970s, the original Makura Tokolau left a legacy of a number of local hits including popular songs Taxi 272 and Toyota.

Looking to revive the stringband group, some of the most musically talented boys from Shepherds came together last year and competed in the inaugural Nabanga Stringband Competition held in November last year.

Makura Tokolau Stringband won the 2020 People's Choice award in which the Vanuatu Tourism Office (VTO) was a proud sponsor of and offered the winners the free production of a music video as a prize. The group was then flown to Emae island by VTO to shoot a music video for the song, with local film makers Groovy Banana behind the camera.

The group's song is called 'Sapotem Lokol Turisim' and it highlights the need for everyone to support local tourism businesses during the challenging times brought on by Covid.

The 'Sapotem Lokol Tourism' song also highlights how we are all domestic tourists: no matter whether we go spel lo sanbij lo wiken, or whether we visit another island for work, for church or just to visit family – we are all domestic tourists.

NABANGA STRINGBAND COMPETITION 2021

Last year's Nabanga Stringband Competition had a successful turnout in which Makura Tokolau Stringband was the winner of the VTO-sponsored People's Choice Award.

This year's Nabanga Stringband Competition is proudly presented by the Nabanga Group Committee and it looks to be bigger than ever. With this year's theme 'Local tourism, Happy Families, Self-Reliance and Climate Change', the Nabanga Group is excited to host this second event this year.

According to Nabanga Group's marketing officer, Mr Mike Esrom, this year's competition will see invitations extended as well with only 14 bands allowed to register for Efate. Two will be selected in the Northern province, two from the Southern province and two bands from Shefa province.

This year's event will see teams compete in a show of creativity and talent to win one of the three major prizes. The first place winner gets Vt 1 million plus studio recording of an album plus 100 Procards digital download copies, while the second winner gets Vt600,000 with album recording plus 100 Procards digital download copies, and third place will get VT400,000 also with album recording and 100 Procards digital download copies.

One of the main goals of the Nabanga Stringband Competition is to empower the community despite the pandemic challenges the world is encountering.



CANOES IN VANUATU



**“The gladdest moment in human life, methinks, is a departure into unknown lands.”

Apparently so fragile and delicate, Vanuatu's canoes are much more than a timber vessel – they are also a marvel of ingenuity and agility. Their shells consist of a hollowed-out tree trunk, retaining the curves of the trees they are carved from, without no keel but tapered to a point at each end, especially at the front. The spars are often made of long bamboo poles linked to stringers, or otherwise tied directly to the gunwhales using coconut fibre cord passed through holes at the very top of the hull. In small canoes, the spars are usually three in number. Some are ornately decorated, especially in Vao, Atchin and Futuna. Vanuatu's canoe are more traditionally used in coastal waters rather than on the open ocean.

The Vanuatu archipelago sits on the Pacific Ring of Fire and is beneath our islands intense volcanic activity stirs. This, and the rings of living coral that have come to hem each of our 83 islands over millenia, means navigation is a challenge. Despite the tremendous fishing opportunities that abound, our people have often looked inland rather than to the tides and currents offshore and their potential for danger.

Yet canoes remain the link between the communities of our different islands, who with courage and determination have ventured from coast to coast for millennia, fishing, trading and and creating bonds between communities over vast distances.

The canoe remains today another great way of discovering the stunning coasts of our islands – an experience of ancient, human-powered sea transport as unique to our way of life as it is rewarding.



ARTIST'S CORNER



DISCOVER SAND DRAWING

Sand drawing (or sandroing in Bislama) is a ni-Vanuatu artistic and ritual tradition and practice, recognised by UNESCO as a Masterpiece of the Oral and Intangible Heritage of Humanity. If you want to know everything about sandroing, the best person to learn from is Edgar Hinge at the National Museum in Port Vila. Passionate about the artform, he can initiate you in this challenging art. Children enjoy it as much as adults.

Sandroing is deeply rooted in many of Vanuatu's cultures. Epi, Paama, Malekula, Ambrym, Pentecost, Ambae, Maevo and Mota Lava all have their very own ways of practicing sandroing.

It is considered to be an ancient way of sharing information. For centuries, it has been an efficient way to communicate messages between communities – and to leave messages behind. But there is much more to it. Great dexterity is needed to perform a sandroing in a single, continuous gesture. Mistake are not allowed, and you must redo the entire drawing if you make one. Each drawing is symmetrical, leading some to consider sandroing to be a genuine method of mathematical training.



There are a number of well-known designs such as the turtle. But each sandroing often hold also several meanings at once, and can symbolize deeper meanings as well: life, death and even love. Getting interested in sandroing is definitely a beautiful way to dive into Vanuatu's enchanting cultures.

MEET JULIETTE PITA

Juliette Pita is a talented yet discreet artist. You may have even already met her and seen her artworks, which elegantly express the scenes of everyday life in Vanuatu. Her representation of the movement of traditional dances is quite striking. You can practically hear the rhythm of the percussion and imagine the harmonious gestures of the dancers. Juliette, was born in Erromango. Drawing and illustrations were, she admits, her favourite hobby in elementary school. Looking around, dreaming, observing the details all around her and reproducing them on paper and tapa has been a lifetime passion. Luckily, the shy and dreamy schoolgirl was noticed in primary school by a teacher who immediately noticed her artistic soul and sought to encourage her. She took classes at the Crafts school, including sculpture, tapestry, and drawing, and received many prizes honouring her talent. Her painting evolved over time, becoming more detailed and more figurative. Thanks to the Alliance Française, she was able to journey to Paris for the Emmanuel Watt Exhibition.
