Enjoy reading and preparing for your next adventure in Vanuatu in 2022! Happy New Year!

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

orba is Vanuatu's best kept secret. Famous for its sandy white beaches, world-class fresh seafood, unique culture and dense rainforests, you can be sure that your visit to the northern islands will be an experience you will never forget.

Each island is unique and offers its own adventure. Choose to visit **Gaua**, **Vanualava**, **Motalava**, **Ra** or **Loh Island** — or island hop between them all to get the ultimate Melanesian island experience!

The islands are relatively small and most attractions are easy to walk to; explore white sand beaches and coral reefs around west Mota Lava and Ra or climb the massive rocks on Ra, or climb the Sleeping Mountain on Mota Lava and visit the Twin Waterfall on Vanualava's shores.

While there are no standard hotels in Torba, the island style bungalows, home-stays, tours and activities offer an affordable and exciting experience.

While visiting the Torba Province you can stay a night at the **Rah Paradise Bungalows** and organize with your hosts to see the region's unique Sea Snake custom dance, or enjoy a tour to the nearby village, mingling with the locals and learning about their everyday lives — how they garden, fish, weave mats, and how they prepare their island dishes and kaya.

While in Torba, a visit to the **Mount Garet Volcano** followed by a paddle across the amazing Lake Letas is a must. You can book a night's stay at **Chez Maureen** and also organize a hike to take a refreshing dip at the foot of the highest waterfall in the South Pacific — the **Siri Waterfall**.

Whether you are looking for a haven away from the rest of the world, a soft-adventure or an adventurous but rewarding hike, Torba Province will definitely meet your needs whatever they may be.

# Where to refresh in



spiritu Santo is the largest island of Vanuatu and famous for its pure white sandy beaches and blue holes. It is home to lush jungles, world-class diving. fresh seafood and more. Whether you're a foodie or an adventure seeker, an avid bird watcher or a scuba enthusiast, Santo has something for everyone.

The Taffuntari Waterfall is a must-visit spot in Santo and visitors will be amazed by this stunning landscape located in South Santo. On this tour you will be picked up and dropped off at this amazing site for a cool refreshing swim and refreshment by the waterfall. Afterwards you will be dropped off at your accommodation. To book. call 544 3483.

For a nice relaxing time on the beach, visit the Champagne Beach, located an hour north of Luganville, and tucked away just before Port Olry on the East coast of Espiritu Santo. This stunning beach has been ranked as one of the most beautiful beaches on Earth and got its name from the way the water here bubbles just like Champagne! This is a great place to relax under shady trees, spend some quality time with family or

stretch your legs on the nearby bush trails. Kids will have a great time playing in the sand between refreshing swims. Entrance fee is Vt500 per person or Vt2,000 per vehicle. Transport to Champagne Beach from Luganville is Vt8,000 one way.




Kayaking or canoeing is also a great way to see some of the more remote parts of the island as you head inland. You can explore a jungle enclosed kayak trip to the Matevulu Blue Hole and enjoy watching the fish dart around the boat as you glide along the water. The Matevulu Blue Hole is a natural swimming hole set amongst tropical jungle, vines, large trees and tropical flowers, making it a peaceful and beautiful spot for a holiday. You can start this tour from Turtle Bay Lodge. The price is Vt2,500 per person through the Turtle Bay Lodge. To book, call 37988.

For something different, why not visit a **Bat Cave** on **Aore Island**. **Freshwater Plantation** on Aore Island offers daily tours of the gardens, coffee, and chocolate plantation and of course the natural bat cave. To get there, you can book the tour through Freshwater Plantation and hop on the ferry after a nice breakfast or lunch by the water at the **Starfish Beach Bar**. You can combine your Bat Cave Tour with a swim or snorkel before heading back to Santo. To book, call 773 1641.

Malo Island is very rich culturally in its historical connections linked to the very first Nivanuatu setters. It's the perfect combination of this history tied in with eco-adventures, snorkeling, river kayaking, bush trekking and diving. There is a stunning blue hole here and it is a hidden gem. It is a must visit spot located east of Malo where you will find the beautiful Malokilikili lagoon. This lagoon is dotted with small islands on a background of stunning turquoise waters.







alampa Province is located in the heart of Vanuatu's Archipelago, and it's made up of Malekula, Ambrym ▲and Paama island. So what can you do to refresh yourself in Malampa Province?

In **Malekula**, the makeup of this mountainous island allows it to be filled with rivers, waterfalls, outrigger canoe tours and more. A short trip to Malekula during some of the country's hottest months will definitely help you refresh and relax. We recommend a visit to the "big river" Pamkumo, or the Lonsinwei Cascades and Waterfall Walk as part of your itinerary while you are there. Neighbouring islands such as **Maskelyne Islands** and other small offshore islands along the east coast of Malekula have sandy beaches and coral reefs with good snorkelling and diving. Make sure you plan a night's stay in one of these exotic and remote islands while in Malekula. A visit to swim with the Dugongs at the nearby **Sakau island** can be organized through your hosts.

**Ambrym island** is the place to go to literally get off the beaten track. From expansive ash plains at the foot of it's twin volcanoes, to mystery-shrouded traditions and powerful dances, to hidden waterfalls and hot springs, there's something to discover at every turn. In West Ambrym you can visit the Puwoma Bay Hot spring located just an hour's boat ride from Craiq Cove. Here you can soak in the hot water minerals and allow your skin to naturally detox.



Have you ever seen a hot waterfall? The Enparite Waterfall and hot springs is another worthy destination and is located between North and West Ambrym and can only be accessed by boat. The waterfall here is super hot, but visitors will be able to bathe near the mouth of the river.

**Lonwolwol Lakeside** is a must-visit if you are looking to refresh while on Ambrym and you can enjoy fishing trips, scenic walks along the lake and bird watching activities from here. You can get the full lakeside experience here with your family and friends if you choose to stay a weekend in their lakeside bungalows.

Paama island is known for its friendly people and abundance of Marine wealth. To relax and refresh, we recommend an afternoon swim at Liro Village. The pebbled beach provides an interesting playground for snorkelling, swimming, and kayaking.


he Manbush trail is an unforgettable four-day hike from the east to west across the wild rainforest of Malekula. The trek takes you to the stunning South West Bay and its pristine black and white sand beaches, passing through the **summit of Mt Laiinbele**, 850m above sea level with 360-degree views of the archipelago.


Along the way, you will encounter dense, untapped jungle; traverse incredible rivers, snack on island kaikai and climb to an incredible 850 meters above

sea level. At the end of the trek, there's still time to cool off in the

clear waters of the **Matanoi River**. Accompanied by not-so-ancient tales of cannibalism, you'll follow your local guide into the dark bush and make yourself at home in a self-sufficient remote village where you will sleep in local houses and learn all about traditional kastom living.

The Manbush trail crosses rivers, passes through deep bush and climbs steep ground. It is a challenging expedition for experiences bushwalkers, taking you ona journey to a part of the world rarely seen by most people.





aewo is an island full of warm and hospitable people, and boasts dense rainforests that contain some of Vanuatu's most beautiful waterfalls. Go chasing waterfalls in Maewo island and discover these hidden secrets.

When deciding on your next holiday spot, make sure to put Maewo on the top of your list. When you first approach **Maewo**, you'll find that both coastlines are covered with black sand beaches and dense rainforest. giving the island a distinctive look. At its highest point, this island sits at 795m above sea level, and is thin and rugged, stretching 47km long and only 6 km wide. Rivers and waterfalls are abundant owing to Maewo's mountainous central chain. providing the perfect opportunity for visitors to go on a waterfall chasing journey. We've listed some of these tours and waterfalls below to give vou a taste of what this island has to

Maewo is also home to some of the best anchorages for yachts. A vacht club is located in Asanvari village in south Maewo, attracting many visitors who come not only to experience the area's famous waterfalls, but also the Magas underwater cave, the bat cave tour. the Moon cave tour, canoe fishing, snorkelling, and local bamboo band, just to name a few of the local (noncascade) attractions.

A good place to start your chasing waterfall itinerary is **Lavoa Cascade**. The Lavoa Cascade located is a 10 minutes' walk from Asanvari village along the beach and coast. You can see the waterfall from the village. The price is Vt1,500 per person including entrance fee and waterfall tour which includes a stop at a lovely pool on top of the waterfall, a stop at a lookout overlooking Ansanvari Bay and village and back to the waterfall where you can also lounge by the bar area and take in the sunsets. To book, call 5434495.

#### Naone Waterfall

Be sure to schedule a visit to Naone Waterfall when you arrive in North Maewo. This waterfall is 20m high and located just a 15-20 minute walk from Naone village through stunning water taro main pool at the foot of the waterfall or jump off the top of the waterfall. The price per person is Vt1,000. To book, call 5355246.

While you are off chasing waterfalls in the south of the island, a stop at the incredible Moon Cave, located just 15 minutes from Narovorovo, is a must-see (and while not a waterfall. it's still wet!) The price is Vt1,500 per person including the boat transfer. We highly recommend you pack a



GoPro or a waterproof camera, as the trip through the cave in the boat will leave you in awe.

Heading north, on the one-hour boat ride from Naone. North Maewo to Asanvari, South Maewo, ask your boat skipper to stop off at one of the more than 25 waterfalls that you

will spot along the way!

Visiting **South Pentecost**? Don't miss the Rell Cave tour! Explore an underground waterfall cascading from the ceiling for only Vt600/ person. Airport transfers can also be arranged. To book, call 5646048.

# Hanare Custom Village Tour

community led tour filled with community pride, hospitality and genuine care, the Hanare custom village tour is not to be missed.

On arrival in the Hanare custom village, you will find yourself surrounded by the lovely ladies of this village as they warmly welcome you with gifts of flowers. baskets, and oils before you are led to the first stop where you are surrounded by warriors who perform a welcome song and dance.

centred around water. Freshwater prawns and water taro is a staple in the local diet and during this tour, you will have the opportunity to witness how it is traditionally prepared by your community quides.

Maewo's food culture here is mostly

Light refreshments are then served before the next round of activities, where you are led to waterfalls and pools where prawn harvesting takes place. During the harvest, you'll be entertained with unpublished tales

and stories which are well-kept secrets of Maewo island.

After the prawn harvesting, kastom dancing takes place followed by the Warriors dance and the Peace dance. Later in the afternoon, you are then treated to the next round of food preparations in which guests are taught to cook the freshly harvested prawns that are placed into bamboo along with other local delicacies. The tour ends with kava tasting with the community.





#### How to get there

To get to Hanare Kastom Village, you will have to catch a flight from Espiritu Santo to Naone Airport before taking a truck transfer to Kaiowo for Vt5,000 per trip. From Kaiowo Village, a further 15 minutes drive will bring you to Hanare Kastom Village. Flights to Maewo via Santo take place once a week.

The price of this tour is Vt5,000 per person and to book, you can call Daniel Duni on 5355246 or email daniel11dunny@gmail.com.


# Where to refresh in **Erromango**?

t's hard to imagine an island that has a size comparably a little larger than New York City, yet at 891 square kilometres, Erromango has less than 3,000 people living on the island.

Being Vanuatu's fourth-largest island, Erromango is a made up of mountainous terrain so for the adventurous at heart, there are many bush walking and trekking activities to do while there. However, Erromango also allows for those looking for a time off to wander around, to come refresh and learn about its unique and colourful history. And of course there are plenty of rivers, and beaches to cool off in as well! So what can you do to refresh in Erromango?

The main arrival point of this island, Williams Bay (known until 2009 as Dillons Bay) is a peaceful place where visitors can enjoy a scenic walk along the Williams River and into its winding valley, where cool waters licked dark round stones. The makeup of the river bed allows for a good environment for tasty crayfish to breed in and for a sparsely populated island, you can be certain that you'll be able to get your hands on some for dinner!

**Upongkor**, one of Erromango's largest villages is located here and you can choose to stay in Dillons Bay Yacht Club or Riverside Guest House. In the morning, a walk down to the beach will provide you with scenic views of the bay and ample opportunity for whale watching. Turtles and



dolphins can also be seen around Erromango when traveling by boat.

From Upongkor, you can organize with your host for a guided boat tour through the Suvu Skull Tour to the white and sandy Suvu Beach to explore ancient caves full of ancient hand stencil drawings and see other historical ruins that span over 2,000 years old.

From Williams Bay, you can walk across to Potnarvin, a large village in the north east.

Once you're there you can visit nearby Potnumla where you can

have a picnic and take a dip in a beautiful river that runs right into the ocean

From Portnarvin you can walk or take a banana boat to Cooks Bay where the village of Ipota is located nearby. Here you can stay at the 3K Guesthouse, located only five minutes from the airport. While in Ipota, you can also visit the big waterfall or make it a whole day tour by adding in a cave visit. An outrigger canoe tour and tour to Ifo village, the site of early human settlement on the island, can also be organized through your host at 3K Guest House.



Another interesting and challenging trek is a three to four hour walk from Williams Bay down to South River and across to Ipota through the Kauri Reserve. It's a bit of a journey, but once you're there, you'll be amazed by the magnificent Kauri trees that are over 1,000 years old.

With its vast and rich history and beautiful landscapes, Erromango invites you to come for a wander and discover it's hidden treasures.





# John Frum Cargo Cult on **Tanna**




In a village far from any US army barracks, nestled between ash plains and tropical trees, dark skinned men in uniforms with red-tipped bamboos would march every year on February 15.



In the late 1930's villagers on the island of Tanna first came into contact with their messiah. They believe this is American, who they call John Frum will one day return and shower them with gifts. Now, every year on February 15, barefoot soldiers clad in home made US Army britches and red tipped bamboo "rifles" slung over their shoulders would march in perfect unison in the Village of **Lamakara** as they hold a grand celebration in honour of this man. It's a sight to see indeed.

This day is known as John Frum day on **Tanna Island**, and these activities are the islander's holiest religious services. On this holiest of days, devotees would travel to the village of Lamakara from all over the island to honor this unknown man, John Frum.





To this day villagers are still waiting for "Radios, TVs, trucks, boats, watches, iceboxes, medicine, Coca-Cola and many other wonderful things."

# **Nicky's** Ultimate Kava Travel Bucket List

e've all had our bucket lists of places to travel to or things to do. In Vanuatu, it is customary for kava drinkers to lift up a shell or two on a day out with family and friends at many of the cool locations at our surrounding beaches or rivers. Nikiatu Kautonga's, a renowned and talented local photographer shares with us his ultimate kava bucket list and the unique kava experiences that he got while traveling around Vanuatu's islands through his work.



#### 1. Floating Beach - Maskelyne Island

At the top of my Kava Bucket list of cool places that I've got to lift up a shell (or plastic) is the Floating Beach or sand island located off the coast of the small archipelago of Maskelyne.

It is an island of pure white sand that appears when the tide is low. It's called the Niel Fat Sunburn Floating Beach by the locals, and interestingly enough it does look like a piece of floating land from a distance. After picking up fresh kava from Sakau island we took the boat across to this island, and man, I tell you that was an amazing experience. Here I was picking up a fresh plastic of 1.5L kava juice from a small island off mainland **Malekula**. Then next, I was on a boat riding past all these beautiful small islands and before my eyes, a whole island of sand appeared and right then and there, my mind was made up that I had to take my first shell on that floating sand island. That experience felt like taking one of the best shells of kava ever, in a lonely paradise in the middle of nowhere.

#### 2. Uri Island, Malekula

Uri island made it onto my bucket list and in the top two because of the almost indescribable feeling of serenity, relaxation, and peace I had sitting on the white sand, looking out at the sunset after my first shell. It's an island that is situated just in front of Lakatoro and a great holiday destination for families as well as single travelers and a haven for kava juice lovers. The kava itself was picked up from Uripiv island and taken across to drink on Uri island. Malekula has many beautiful islands with stunning beaches surrounding it.



#### 3. Fanla Kastom Village, Ambrym

Drinking kava at a kastom village is a whole other experience as I've come to learn. After witnessing the incredible and earth-moving kastom shows, I sat down with the elders and men and had a shell. The Kava was called 'Morning Fresh', however, whether I felt fresh or not the next morning was debatable. After the first shell, I did what everyone would say in bislama -- 'me stap smile kranke'. Which means smiling uncontrollably and nodding my head in unison to every word that was being spoken by the 'kastom men'. But this isn't the reason why drinking kava at Fanla Kastom Village made it to my bucket list. The main reason was that when you drink kava in a traditional setting. the conversations steer away from the urban life that you are used to in a normal nakamal around Port Vila and you find yourself drifting off into the distant tales and stories of long before, you exchange and reaffirm your own knowledge with the traditional knowledge. Drinking Kava in this situation then became about learning and I felt connected with the people and the land even though my own island is all the way down south.

#### 4. Maewo Island

Maewo Island made a very strong impression in my mind due to the unique experience I had of drinking Kava there. To start with, the Kava itself is prepared using coral to grind the kava into a stone bowl. To drink the kava I had to enter a low and long traditional building. This building is split up into different rooms and how far you advance into the building is dependent on your ranking. As a new visitor, I stopped in one of the first rooms and was shown a place to sit. I was told that the highest-ranking people sat in the last room at the end. Before I had entered, the person who made my kava had to wash my hands with water from a coconut shell as per strict customs. Once inside, the same person called me over and presented me with my first shell of kava. It was the strongest shell that I had ever drank in my life. Within seconds I went mute, however, the feeling was very nice. I sat still for a good 20 minutes 'listening to the kava'.





#### 5. Small island in Torres Group

We got our Kava from the mainland and paddled across to one of the small islands of Torres. From there we watched the sunset and lit a nice bonfire on the beach. When the bonfire died down we took our torches and walked along the beach picking up the big red crabs off the beach and throwing them into the fire for our 'wasem maot'. Here we were, miles away from the urban life, sitting on a beautiful beach, drinking kava and eating sweet crabs. That is definitely one for the books.
