
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PROUD TORBA

Her agenda is intense as she also studies at the USP to become a teacher.

Although Delvin lives and works in the capital, she is originally from TORBA Province. Her native island is on the very top of the map in Torres. She describes the place at "the" place to visit: the beautiful white sand beaches the waterfalls, the cascades, the pools and the numerous caves to explore. There is much to discover, both on the sea side and the land side.

The history is very rich and the communities are very proud of their traditions. The best is yet to hop from an island to another.

She also recommends to explore the Banks. "Gaua is a jewel" she says. The customs in the islands are amazing: the water music of course, but also the Mota Lava custom dancing, inspired by the banded seas snake. The traditional attire, all in black and white is incredible.

On their journey to the North, foodies will not be disappointed: lobster and coconut crab are just the best! So fresh and tasty! A lot of the cooking is prepared in bamboo in a very traditional way. Simple but delicious. The Yams harvest in April is a great moment of celebration.

When you ask Delvin what make her proud of her province she does not hesitate a minute:

"The kindness of the people. God provides a lot of resources. Therefore, people in Torba are happy to live a simple life. They are not greedy for more. There are very few disputes as community cultivate kindness and respect."

Jerry is originally from Efate. From a very young age, he knew he wanted to work in tourism. He believes he has had the best training one can have. His two first experiences were at the Havanna Resort and then, on the private island of Ratua. He was eager to learn – he still is, and was lucky enough to spend time with great professionals willing to share their knowledge and experience.

After a few years, he decided it was time for him to create his own business. He moved to Santo, started a taxi business and quickly afterwards, he launched his own accommodation.



By the way, if you want a good laugh with the locals, ask them about the origin of the name of Malekula.




66 Living together in the kindest way: when respect is much more than a word.

YOU'RE NOT IN THE METAVERSE, YOU'RE IN THE MANARO VOLCANO



1 Banana Bay Beach Club

Dreaming of a nearby island escape? Think lush green palm trees with a mix of Santorini vibes and authentic island thatched roofs and you get the Banana Bay Beach club. Run by a mother-daughter team, this charming spot is located along an island highway lined with plantations full of tall coconut trees within a 20 minutes reach from Port Vila. If you don't look to your side at the third yellow line along the Banana Bay you might miss it which is too bad. You'll find great swimming and snorkelling, gorgeous sunsets, BBQs, rustic beach huts and showers under the sky are guaranteed. Banana Bay Beach Club is open 7 days a week.



2 Hideaway Island

For a simple-no-hassle plan, a mini trip to hideaway island is highly recommended. Mail an underwater postcard, snorkel the day away or simply relax on the beach lounge area. The staff are excited to be open once again to day visitors and locals. For dive enthusiasts - Hideaway Island Resort also offers fully equipped PADI Dive tours. With 15 diving sites in total, you have everything you'll need to enjoy your dive experience whether you are new to diving or a seasoned veteran.



3 Club Hippique

Club Hippique Adventure Park is a place filled with love and care and a home for all. The Ranch is located at the stunning Etmat Bay with white sandy beaches surrounded by greenery which makes the short 15-minutes commute to the ranch well worth it. It's the people that make a place feel like home and for Club Hippique Adventure park, this couldn't be more true. 
Top Rock Lookout

have formed in the heart of ebony colored rocks.

When asked to talk about the small and big pleasures of the Shepards Islands, she proposes without hesitation the celebrations of the end of the year which are a great moment of sharing. She makes our mouths water when she talks about miraculous fishes and delicious shellfish that can be eaten raw or cooked with laplap.







She tells the unique feeling of sailing sea above the underwater volcano. "First of all, if you look at the surface, you will see bubbles. There are the sign of the fumaroles' activity. It is quite impressive to to imagine that you are floating over the great Kwai." Legend has it that a young man deeply hurt in his feeling for being cruelly mocked by the locals cast a spell on the entire population living on the flanks of the volcano. His anger and enchantments caused the volcano to erupt to the point of an explosion that separated the land into islands. This ancient legend is actually the fruit of a huge volcanic eruption that occurred in the 15th century.

When you ask Lucy what makes her proud of being from Shefa, she beams: "I love the way people are solidary and there for one another. Showing up to help and assist members of our community is not only a tradition, it has become part of our character!"

PROUD TAFEA

Less is more. We cherish simplicity and the present moment

With great simplicity, families and friends join together to celebrate the union of the lovers in a very pure tradition.

Ronnie is very proud of this culture which leaves room for simplicity. At a time when everything is accelerating, Futuna is still one of the rare places where the present moment is the most beautiful gift to share.




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
