

IN THE AIR

See the Fleurieu from a different perspective! Jump into a helicopter or out of a plane – the choice is yours. Whichever you choose, the adrenalin rush and the views are off the charts. If you like something a little different, biplanes and gyrocopters are also available locally. And don't forget you can get airborne on the ground too – courtesy of a windsurfer.

UNDER THE WATER

It's another world beneath the waves. Snorkellers and scuba divers have access to untouched locations that teem with marine life. For a special experience, head out to the ex-HMAS Hobart, scuttled in Yankalilla Bay to form an artificial dive reef. The site is regarded as one of South Australia's premier dive sites, along with the other fantastic diving locations including Port Noarlunga Reef and Aldinga Reef.

CRUISING



GO FISH

Take the bait and have a go at fishing from a beach, riverbank or estuary. Try your luck within the Encounter Marine Park or join one of the fishing charters that leave from Victor Harbor, Worrina and Cape Jervis. Goolwa Beach also offers a chance to go cockling, but be sure to only remove them during cockle season. Also be aware that size, bag, boat and sanctuary zone restrictions apply.

TEE OFF

Don't forget to polish your clubs and pack the golf bag when you head to Fleurieu Peninsula. The area boasts several highly ranked golf courses with million-dollar views. Places to take a swing include Ashbourne, Mount Compass, Goolwa, Victor Harbor, Strathalbyn, Lady Bay, Willunga, Worrina Cove and Yankalilla.

There are plenty of coastal places to launch your boat or wedge your rod in the sand and wait for a nibble. If you prefer to get among the sea creatures, try snorkelling or scuba diving.

FLOAT YOUR BOAT

The ocean has many secrets and you never know when a dolphin might drop by to say hello! There's nothing like a day on the water – fresh or salt, and Fleurieu Peninsula has the best of both worlds when it comes to boating. It's not all about motors either – who doesn't love to sit back and relax in a sail boat or fly across the waves when the wind picks up?

WATCH FOR WHALES

Fleurieu Peninsula offers one of the most popular and accessible places to view the giants of the deep. Southern Right and humpback whales are regular visitors to the picturesque coastline between May and October. Many visitors get a glimpse of these gentle giants and often their calves as well as they enjoy the warmer waters before heading back to sub-Antarctic waters.

BIRD WATCHING

Twitchers rejoice! Fleurieu Peninsula's diverse habitat is home to more than 250 bird species, some of high conservation importance. Keep your eyes peeled for hooded plovers, cockatoos, peregrine falcons and other raptors. For further information on bird details, maps, locations or brochures call into a local Visitor Information Centre.

SEE CREATURES

While watching out for whales, prepare to see playful dolphins and seals. Australian sea lions favour the barrage area at Goolwa while bottlenose and common dolphins love cruising the waves all around the coast. They will often drop in to accompany surfers or ride the bow waves of your boat.

MEET THE NATIVES

Tent Hill in Deep Creek Conservation Park is the place to reliably spot Western Grey kangaroos who tend to gather in groups. Be on the lookout for echidnas and possums as well. Urimbirra Wildlife Park at Victor Harbor is another great place to get up close and personal with wildlife, and a perfect outing for the kids as well.



Myponga Reservoir Reserve

NATURAL WONDERS

Myponga Reservoir is open for kayaking, fishing and walking. If it's waterfalls you're into, look no further than Ingalalla Falls, Deep Creek Waterfall and Hindmarsh Falls. View evidence of glaciers from 250 million years ago at Inman Valley's Glacier Rock. Onkaparinga Gorge is a great place to relax and recharge, with tranquil water holes, river red gums and many walking tracks.

ROAD TRIP TIPS

Off-road enthusiasts can take the steep four-wheel-drive track to Blowhole Beach in Deep Creek Conservation Park. The area boasts many remote and rugged places, less than an hour from Adelaide, some permitting beach driving. If you've not got your own vehicle a tour operator can take you there in comfort.

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

ABORIGINAL HISTORY AND CULTURE

The history of Fleurieu Peninsula dates back thousands of years before European settlement and is documented by the Kurna, Peramangk and Ngarrindjeri people. Special places and sites on Fleurieu Peninsula are links to the creation of their lands. Arts and dreamtime stories document seasons, native animals, plants, climate and relationship to country. Moana Sands Conservation Park is a significant Aboriginal cultural heritage site where coastal dunes are important to the traditions of the Kurna people who made their summer camps in the sand hills by Pedler Creek. Archaeological artefacts including burial sites and shell middens, some dating back 6000 years, have been found in this area. For a special experience of local culture, take a Ngarrindjeri day cruise on the Coorong and enjoy an interpretive walk through the dunes as well as a bush tucker trail. Contemporary Indigenous art works are proudly displayed at many galleries, including Red Poles which houses a regional showcase representing Indigenous communities.



Nan Hai Pu Tuo Temple, Sellick's Hill

CULTURAL DIVERSITY

At Sellick's Hill, a giant beachside Buddha statue, standing 18 metres tall has been warmly welcomed by locals and visitors alike. The spiritual landmark is part of the Nan Hai Pu Tuo Temple and is intended to bring peace, harmony, prosperity and wealth to South Australia. The property is about 137 acres and extends about three kilometres along the coast. Enjoy the view of the impressive statue from idyllic rolling hills. This Buddhist place of worship attracts many visitors and it the only one in the Southern Hemisphere.

HERITAGE EXPERIENCES


In 1802, European explorer, Matthew Flinders met French explorer, Nicolas Baudin near the mouth of the Murray River. Baudin named the region Fleurieu after a French navy minister and their meeting point was named Encounter Bay. In the 1890s American whalers made their home at Victor Harbor, seeking the Southern Right whale which tourists still come to see today, though for a very different reason! The entire region is rich in heritage experiences. Ride the iconic Cockle Train between Goolwa and Victor Harbor then get aboard the horse-drawn tram which takes you at a leisurely pace along the landmark wooden causeway to Granite Island. For more old school travel, try a trip on the *PS Oscar W*, a restored paddle steamer located at Goolwa. And don't forget the biplanes, based at the vintage and charming Aldinga Airfield. Take in the beauty of the landscape in a classic, open cockpit Waco biplane, bringing back a bygone era of nostalgia and romance.



Argus House, Strathalbyn

HERITAGE RICH TOWN SPACES

Heritage abounds in the streets of many Fleurieu Peninsula towns. Strathalbyn has more than 60 Heritage-listed buildings and a history dating back to 1839. Perched on the banks of the Angas River, there are shops specialising in antiques, collectibles, art and crafts. If you visit in August, be sure to attend the Strathalbyn Treasure Market – a popular gathering for collectors. Port Elliot also boasts some historic antique shops and buildings dating back to 1840. Victor Harbor has a unique character, loved and enjoyed by residents and the many visitors who come to enjoy the area. A long-term seaside destination for holiday makers, there are many surviving historic buildings from a bygone era which add to the appeal of this main town. A Heritage Places Brochure or Discovery Trail Brochure to discover places of historical significance in Victor Harbor can be found Victor Harbor Civic Centre, Library and Visitor Information Centre.

The Salopian Inn currently stocks more than 230 different gins from all around the world. McLaren Vale Distilling Company specialises in small batch gins, whiskies, vodkas and liqueurs.

WINE REGIONS

Reaping the benefits of a maritime climate created due to the proximity to Gulf St Vincent to the west, Lake Alexandrina to the east and the Southern Ocean, the Fleurieu is home to no less than four recognised wine regions – Currency Creek, McLaren Vale, Langhorne Creek and Southern Fleurieu – with vineyards now also springing up around Kuitpo.

While all these regions enjoy a Mediterranean climate, it is the influence of the various soil types that dictate the individual flavour.

Those just beginning their wine journey will enjoy sampling the local drop, perhaps chatting to the winemaker themselves, and fully immersing themselves in the experience. Joining a hosted tour is a great way to make a start – even if you think you know your wines.

Try a new label – or variety – you don't know and you may well come away with a new favourite!

Many wineries offer dining or shared platters as well as wine tasting, or you can visit one of the many eateries in the area. See pages 24 to 30 for some suggestions.

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Gemtree

Perched atop of a ridge overlooking stunning views sits the Tasting Room of organic and biodynamic winery, Gemtree.

Here you can immerse yourself in a personalised guided Tasting Experience and perhaps a tour of the Biodynamic Hut, experiencing first-hand biodynamic farming.

After your tasting, why not grab a local produce picnic pack and a bottle of wine and take a stroll through the Gemtree Eco-trail where you can explore the restored native landscape and relax in the wide-open spaces.





Gemtree Wines, McLaren Flat

Just 45 minutes south of Adelaide, you will find the birthplace of wine in South Australia. The first vines were planted in what is now known as the McLaren Vale wine region by John Reynell in 1838, two years after the proclamation of the colony of South Australia.

Noted for its varied terrain, this is one of the most geologically diverse regions in the world and present a wide variety to soil types. Winemakers in the region have been shifting focus from big, powerful styles to instead showcase varietal characteristics and influences of terroir. They are members of a collaborative and innovative community which prides itself on leading the way in organic

practices, water management and climate-appropriate plantings.

The most commonly produced wines include shiraz, a signature of the region and the most widely planted, cabernet sauvignon and grenache. More recently, plantings have extended to Italian and Spanish styles such as fiano, vermentino, barbera and tempranillo.

McLaren Vale and McLaren Flat, a micro region to the east, are home to more than 150 producers and 80 cellar doors of all shapes and sizes offering a wide range of tasting – and often dining – experiences. From cute heritage buildings to architectural masterpieces the diversity is endless, but quality remains paramount.



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



LANGHORNE CREEK

Located on the eastern edge of the peninsula, only an hour from the city, you may be surprised to discover Langhorne Creek is South Australia's third largest wine region, home to boutique winemakers but also growing grapes for some of the biggest names in Australian wine. Cabernet sauvignon and shiraz top the list but look out for alternative varieties such as malbec.

This is a low-lying region of deep alluvial sandy loams, which benefit from the

occasional seasonal flooding of the Bremer River. Here the winds that blow from the Southern Ocean across Lake Alexandrina keep the temperatures cooler and more consistent – and prevent frost that can damage the grapes.

Here you will discover world-class wines in architecturally designed cellar doors offering a range of dining and tasting experiences worth investigating – and now a brewery.

FLEURIEU PENINSULA



SUN, FUN & ADVENTURE

FLEURIEU COAST

Boasting some of South Australia's best beaches, the Fleurieu Coast is a magnet for families, nature lovers and adventure seekers. A seaside playground stretches from **Christies Beach** and **Port Noarlunga** to **Sellicks Beach** with diving and snorkelling, surfing and swimming all on offer.

Just a little inland you'll find the town of **Myponga**, gateway to the activities available at Myponga Reservoir. When the spillway is open the drive across the Myponga Reservoir's retaining wall and through the catchment is awe-inspiring. There is a lookout with car parking and a picnic area with amazing views. The journey across the crest of the range provides a sweeping panorama of the landscape back to the Adelaide metro coastline. Close by you'll find **Myponga Beach**, a small seaside cove surrounded

by holiday houses and coastal hills, offering excellent swimming and diving, as well as rock and surf fishing.

Continue towards the coast, stopping to enjoy the views from the hilltop lookouts, and you'll come to the holiday hotspots of **Carrickalinga** and **Normanville**. Several golf courses in this part of Fleurieu Peninsula have the added advantage of these magnificent views.

The Inman Valley Road between Victor Harbor and **Yankalilla** is lined with huge gum trees and provides a contrast with the ocean environment. Bushwalkers love this part of the Peninsula, while amateur geologists (along with the professionals) head for Glacier Rock, one of the world's largest glacial relics dating back 500 million years to when the region was covered with ice.

The stunning Ingalalla Falls in the Second Valley Forest are located 10 kilometres

south of Normanville where rockpools and waterfalls attract a variety of birdlife.

Anglers will be drawn to the jetties fishing spots at **Second Valley**, **Rapid Bay** and **Cape Jervis** (also the departure point of the Kangaroo Island ferries). Here, far down in the toe of Fleurieu Peninsula, is the popular Deep Creek Conservation Park.

The visitor experience at Deep Creek Conservation Park is being enhanced and expanded in stages to include a new day visitor facility, a universally-accessible walking trail, and upgrades to existing campgrounds and amenities.

Make time to explore the Wild South Coast Way, a section of the Heysen Trail running from Cape Jervis to Victor Harbor and connecting the parks that run along this breathtaking southern coastline.





Aldinga Beach

ALDINGA

44 kilometres from Adelaide

In the early 1840s, Aldinga was a busy farming centre with two flour mills and six hotels, and this sense of history isn't far away. Aldinga has become popular for trendy retail stores, street art, bakeries, cafés and restaurants, all centred around its historic and busy hotel. The town provides services for locals and the many visitors who flock to the holiday homes located in nearby Aldinga Beach and Port Willunga, and those exploring the regional flora and fauna of the Aldinga Scrub Conservation Park.

CAPE JERVIS

107 kilometres from Adelaide

Cape Jervis is the gateway and departure point for the ferry services to Kangaroo Island. Here you can embark on a 45 minute journey across Backstairs Passage that reveals the rugged and spectacular coastline of this part of Fleurieu Peninsula.



Morgans Beach, Cape Jervis

This is a popular base for fishermen, with good boat, jetty and beach fishing, as well as various boating services available – even fresh fish for those without time or inclination to catch their own. There are also several local operators that provide fishing charters and boat cruises along the coast. Bushwalkers have nearby Deep Creek Conservation Park or they can walk from Cape Jervis to Victor Harbor, which is a section of South Australia's famed four-day Heysen Trail.

Nearby Fishery Beach is the site of the former Cape Jervis Whale Fishery, which is now a State Heritage Site and place of archaeological significance. Interpretive signage can be found at the location, as well as a revegetation project that attracts Glossy Black cockatoos.

Now just a tiny hamlet at the turn off leading eastward to Victor Harbor, **Delamere** provides an ideal starting point for exploring the nearby Deep Creek and Talisker conservation parks where ruins of old



Myponga Reservoir Reserve

Cornish silver-lead mines, established in 1862, provide a remnant of South Australia's mining past. There are fine views over Backstairs Passage from the hillsides, including views of Starfish Hill wind farm.

MYPONGA

60 kilometres from Adelaide

Myponga is at the centre of rich grazing and dairy country, where herds of Friesian cows are often joined at dusk by mobs of Grey kangaroos. Much of the region's water comes from the nearby reservoir, on which the thriving local floriculture and specialist nurseries depend. In the township there are a weekend craft and produce market, general stores, a cafe and a boutique brewery. The township sits alongside the Myponga Reservoir Reserve. The trail here is ideal for walking and running with room for families to enjoy a picnic with several picnic tables along the trail. You can also head to the lookout to take in the scenic surrounds. Walking, running and cycling on the two walking trails takes

you through open plains, forested areas and native vegetation. Fleurieu Coast Free bikes are available to hire through Smiling Samoyed Brewery and the unsealed trail is a shared-use path. The Reservoir has just been opened up to kayaking and on-water fishing. More than 120 bird species live in the area including some that enjoy life by the water and others that can be found inland. You can also watch for native animals, lizards and listen for frogs.

NORMANVILLE

76 kilometres from Adelaide

Known affectionately to locals as 'Normy', **Normanville** is a popular seaside resort town with long sandy beaches, good camping and other accommodation choices.

Join the locals for coffee or a meal in the town or head beachside before trying one of the water-based activities including snorkelling, fishing and scuba diving on the inshore reefs that once were the downfall of many sailors shipwrecked in the 19th century. On shore you can try horse riding, explore the Heritage-



Carrickalinga

listed Normanville sand dune system or take the shared walking track and bike trail to **Carrickalinga**, a holiday retreat popular for its white sandy beach, crystal clear waters, rock pools and great views over Roma Mitchell Bay and Yankalilla Bay.

The best drive into Carrickalinga is from the north via Myponga Reservoir to enjoy the dramatic coastal views. For more great views, make sure you stop at the lookout – or perhaps the brewery – on Forktree Road.

Just five kilometres south of Normanville is the championship golf course and resort at **Lady Bay**, with spectacular coastal views also shared with the informal shack settlement established between the main road and the gulf half a century ago.

Heading south from Lady Bay, you'll find a long stretch of Norfolk pine trees providing many choices of picnic spots. Where the road leaves the coast and heads into a gorge stop at the lookout with a memorial to the ex-*HMAS Hobart* that was scuttled offshore.



Rapid Bay

RAPID BAY

100 kilometres from Adelaide

The small hamlet of **Rapid Bay** is nestled snugly between a long sandy beach and towering cliffs. The approach is down a winding road with spectacular views across the gulf. Limestone mining, which once dominated the bay, has declined but the long jetty remains, now joined by a new jetty that has become a popular fishing spot. The bay is also a well-known dive site and one of the areas the endangered Leafy seadragon calls home. Kayakers will enjoy the rugged coastline, with its stunning sea caves, stretching to Second Valley.

Look out for the replica of the boulder on which SA's founding father, Colonel William Light, carved his initials after alighting from his ship *The Rapid* to take his first steps in the new colony. He is reported to have said "I have hardly seen a place I like better". Today, many would agree with him and it has been suggested that there were plans to make Rapid Bay South Australia's capital prior to the discovery of the Adelaide Plains.



Jetty Caravan Park Normanville

SECOND VALLEY

90 kilometres from Adelaide

The main road into the tiny coastal port of Second Valley is marked by the old mill, now home to a restaurant run by a local family who pride themselves on sourcing Fleurieu Peninsula growers and farmers. The town itself, hugging the edge of Yankalilla Bay, is reminiscent of a Cornish fishing village and its name comes from being the "next" valley from where Colonel William Light settled at Rapid Bay.

The rugged geological formations and steep coastal cliffs help make Second Valley unforgettable, while fishermen know it best for the fine fishing, whether it's from the jetty, rocks or from boats anchored in the bay. Its protected waters provide scuba divers and snorkellers with a memorable experience, with fur seals and Leafy seadragons often coming out to play.



Yankalilla Bay

WIRRINA COVE

89 kilometres from Adelaide

With spectacular hills plunging into kilometres of pristine coastline, Wirrina Cove is home to a resort, 18 hole golf course and the 210 berth Marina St Vincent. Enjoy mini golf with the kids, play tennis, wander along kilometres of trails (including a stretch of the Tjilbruke Trail), book a fishing charter, go horse riding, dive the ex-HMAS Hobart or simply watch kangaroos grazing.

YANKALILLA

74 kilometres from Adelaide

One of the larger towns in Fleurieu Peninsula, Yankalilla has retained its 'old village' atmosphere, with the pretty Bungala River flowing through the township. Take a walk along the tree-lined streets, admiring the rural architecture and cottage gardens.

EXTEND YOUR STAY

Stay a little longer and really explore the great beaches up and down the Fleurieu Coast by basing yourself at **Moana Tourist Park** or **Christie's Beach Tourist Park**. Choose from drive-through sites and beachside cabins and make the most of the tennis courts and playgrounds.

Yankalilla is home to the first country Josephite school, opened by Saint Mary McKillop in 1867, which is now a private residence.

In town you'll find a famous bakery, a well-stocked supermarket, banking facilities, a great pub and a number of art, craft and bric-a-brac stores for the keen bargain hunter. Drop into the Visitor Information Centre for maps and advice on things to do. A must-see while in Yankalilla is the town's historical museum, which is constantly being highly rated by visitors.

Yankalilla is the site of one of the world's newest Marian Shrines – the Shrine of Our Lady of Yankalilla, which attracts pilgrims from around the world to see the image of the Madonna and child that has appeared on the rear wall of the Anglican Church.

ALDINGA BEACH

Aldinga Beach is one of the few beaches in Australia where cars are permitted to drive on sections of the broad sand, making access to this safe swimming and impressive surf beach especially easy. Aldinga Beach is also a good spot for scuba diving and snorkelling, with the beach overlooking a unique aquatic reserve established to protect a rare reef formation.

CHRISTIES BEACH

Christies Beach is a popular family beach with safe swimming for all ages, a large foreshore reserve for picnics and an all-season boat ramp. A caravan park sits in prime position a stone's throw from the beach and there is a large shopping precinct nearby which provides an excellent range of services and the Original Open Market, open the first and third Sunday of the month, features a range of home-grown fresh fruit and vegetables, plants, crafts and collectables. The Coast Park Trail takes walkers over the clifftop to Port Noarlunga.

MASLIN BEACH

Stretching three kilometres in length, this is one of the prettiest beaches in South Australia and maintained in pristine condition, with high cliffs providing a great picnic spot or sunset viewing. Nude sunbathing and swimming is permitted – but only at the southern end of the beach.

MOANA

Norfolk Island pines dominate the foreshore of this popular beachside town. With its clean white sandy beaches, Moana is noted for its summer swimming, year-round fishing, snorkelling and coastal walks. Vehicles can also be driven onto the sand during the summer months, meaning you can easily transport all your gear – including a beginner's surfboard – to the water. Search for sea life in the rockpools at the northern end of the beach.

PORT NOARLUNGA

Port Noarlunga is a popular family holiday destination and fishing spot. Low tides expose a Heritage-listed reef that provides a unique natural marine reserve, but scuba divers will enjoy the marked underwater trail. There are many aquatic activities on offer including kayaking, snorkelling, surfing, fishing and stand-up paddle boarding. Walkers can head for the river estuary and Onkaparinga River Recreation Park and families will enjoy the Jubilee Park Adventure Playground. Once you've worked up an appetite, head for one of the seaside dining options.

PORT WILLUNGA

Jetty pylons are all that remain of this coastal village's early days as a grain port. The soft, sandy beach is a pleasant family haven, overlooked by cliffs where fishermen once carved out caves to store their boats and nets. *The Star of Greece* was shipwrecked off this coast and you can dive the wreck 20 metres off shore before dining at the restaurant that bears its name.

SELICKS BEACH

As popular with families for its safe swimming as it is with anglers, Sellicks Beach has good boat launching facilities and is an excellent spot for windsurfing, kite boarding and paragliding. It is also one of the few beaches where parking is allowed on the sand, with a beach pass or by paying a beach access fee. For incredible views of the coastline visit the Nan Hai Pu Tao Buddhist temple just south of the beach.

WATER AND BEACH ACTIVITIES

Diving and snorkelling

The Fleurieu Reef created 20 years ago with the scuttling of ex-HMAS Hobart in Yankalilla Bay, allows divers access to the engine room and gun turrets. For dive permits and information on South Australian Marine Parks scan here.



The Scuba Divers Federation of SA provide information on this and other dive sites.



Safe swimming

The sweeping curve of Horseshoe Bay at Port Elliot provides sheltered swimming and you'll find long, clean beaches at Normanville and Carrickalinga. Other swimming beaches include Port Willunga, South Port, Aldinga, Silver Sands, Sellicks, Morgan Beach and Moana. Lifesavers patrol many of these beaches from October to March – just remember to swim between the flags.

Other activities

Explore the rock pools at Lady Bay or Middleton. Anglers can throw a line in at Second Valley, Myponga Beach or Rapid Bay or launch a boat at Wirrina Cove or Encounter Bay.

WHERE OCEAN MEETS RIVER

SOUTH COAST

Stretching from the toe of Fleurieu Peninsula to the mouth of the Murray River, the South Coast has been a popular destination for holiday makers looking to escape the city heat for generations. The coast wraps around Encounter Bay which was named in 1802 by the famed navigator and mapmaker Matthew Flinders of the *Investigator* after his encounter there with French explorer Nicholas Baudin on board *Le Geographe*. Today the coast offers a natural playground with surfing and swimming beaches and coastal walking trails extending all the way to the point where one of Australia's main rivers floods into the Coorong. The freshwater lakes and estuaries, which are easily accessed from **Goolwa**, provide their own source of

entertainment with sailing, water skiing, kayaking and other water sports.

Holiday homes and caravan parks jostle for the best positions and views up and down the coast, and the towns dotted along the way are full of cafés, pubs and restaurants offering a wide range of dining options. One of the most sought-after campsites is at **Port Elliot** on the shores of Horseshoe Bay.

Golfers can take advantage of several courses in the area – there are two at **Victor Harbor** – while cyclists will enjoy the Encounter Bikeway running the length of the coast, often alongside the iconic historic railway, a ride on which is a must for every visitor whatever your age.


Families will love the easy beach access with safe swimming for the young ones

and surf for those with more experience, and perhaps a few lessons, under their belt. Off the beach, skate parks and adventure playgrounds can provide hours of entertainment. Call into the local Visitor Information Centre for more ideas to keep the family busy.

Each winter, the coast attracts another type of visitor which always causes much excitement. From July to October Southern Right whales can be spotted from the shore when they inhabit the waters to bear and raise their calves before travelling to cooler waters.

Middleton is just one of the prime whale-spotting locations.

So, make a list of things to see and do, and plan to visit soon.



Granite Island, Victor Harbor

VICTOR HARBOR

83 kilometres from Adelaide

Situated on a wide, sandy arc of Encounter Bay, Victor Harbor has been the summer holiday choice for generations of South Australians and is affectionately known as "Victor".

This seaside destination offers sun, surf and sand, clear turquoise waters and stunning views, outstanding early colonial architecture, modern pubs, cafés and restaurants – just about everything you could want for a beach holiday. Local accommodation includes a range of hotels, golf resorts and beachfront apartments and holiday houses. This is a great base for golfers from where you can easily reach the many courses dotted around the region.

Take a ride on the iconic tram drawn by majestic Clydesdale horses across the causeway to stunning Granite Island and walk around the island to admire the stunning views of the coast and surrounding harbor. Ask at the Visitor Information Centre about tours to see the resident Little penguins.

You can board Australia's first public railway known as the Cackle Train for a family-friendly steam rail experience travelling on the old lines along the coast, through to Port Elliot, Middleton and Goolwa. Or maybe join a boat tour to view this stunning coast from the water and see dolphins and other marine creatures at their playful best.

There is plenty to see and do in this spectacular region including visiting Mount Billy Conservation Park and Hindmarsh Falls. A popular section of the Heysen Trail winds itself along the coast offering great views and the opportunity to spot local flora and native animals in their natural environment. Visit Urimbirra Wildlife Park for close encounters with koala, kangaroos, wallabies, emus, local birds and other Australian wildlife.

In the cooler months Southern Right whales frequently visit Encounter Bay – learn more about these fascinating mammals, as well as other marine inhabitants at the SA Whale Centre.

Along this coast, you'll find some of South Australia's best surf beaches. Waitpinga Beach takes its name from an Aboriginal name meaning home of the wind. Well known for its fishing, mostly salmon and mullet, it's also popular for its surf break. Keep in mind this is an exposed beach that has the best consistent surfing this close to Adelaide, but it is recommended only for experienced swimmers and surfers with what may be considered dangerous conditions. There are rough waves, with powerful rips. Other surf spots include Chiton Rocks, Dump Beach and Boomer Beach. Check with a South Australian Surf Life Saving Club or for safety tips or see page 41.



Goolwa Beach

GOOLWA

89 kilometres from Adelaide

Goolwa was once a thriving river port – the last on the Murray River before it reached the Southern Ocean. Today, Goolwa offers a steam-to-steam experience with *PS Oscar W*, a 100+-year-old authentic paddle steamer, and the Cackle Train, a steam train journey.

The town still has many historical features, its present day life is as a busy regional centre with great pubs, a distillery, restaurants and cafés, and is a popular gateway to the Coorong National Park and the lakes system near the mouth of the Murray River.

Steeped in history Goolwa offers a subtle, unpretentious beauty and many wonderful old sandstone buildings dating back to the 1850s. Today Goolwa is embracing life at a slower pace and is Australia's first Cittaslow Town.

The Goolwa State Heritage area surrounds the Goolwa Visitor Information Centre, which should be the starting point for any visitor wanting to learn more about the town and its many attractions, as well as its colourful river port history and the Ngarrindjeri culture of the region.

Explore the local waterways by taking a cruise on the lower Murray River on an authentic working paddle steamer or an eco-cruise into the Coorong. Australia's oldest railway, commissioned in 1854, still runs a historic passenger service, the Cackle Train, between Goolwa, Middleton, Port Elliot and Victor Harbor.

Goolwa also fronts the Southern Ocean where a sand dune boardwalk provides great views and cockles gather pipis or cockles (a mollusc) on the beach. **Goolwa Beach** is a popular surf spot.

In its heyday, Goolwa was the only place in Australia where paddle steamers and steam trains met to carry produce for shipping overseas.

Hindmarsh Island is home to the Southern Hemisphere's largest freshwater marina development, including waterfront residences, a large marina, kayaking, windsurfing, tavern, café, playground, tennis courts and a biking and walking trail.

The island is home to South Australia's newest conservation park, Lawari (Ngarrindjeri for Cape Barren Goose) because of its important bird habitats. In winter there are whole fields

of grazing black swans and in summer there are flocks of Cape Barren geese.

The highlight of any visit is to marvel at the Murray Mouth. Stay awhile and enjoy fish and chips from the caravan at Sugars Beach; you can see the mouth of the Murray River – where the river meets the sea.

Hindmarsh Island is home to the only island (Lonely Island) within an island (Hindmarsh Island) within an island (Australia) in the southern hemisphere. Lonely Island is located in the centre of a dried up salt lake, that fills with water in winter.

This is where the old meets the new, with a monument at the island's highest point symbolising where Captain Charles Sturt and Collet Barker stood when he identified and mapped the Murray Mouth.

Now a well-established wine region with several popular wineries and cellar doors, **Currency Creek's** earliest claim to fame was that it was once proposed as the site for the South Australian capital. The Lions Park provides a good, serviced picnic spot beside a spring-fed stream, with one of South Australia's tallest rail viaducts just a short walk up the valley.

Watch out for the Aboriginal canoe trees in the area and try to allow time to walk through the nearby Black Swamp, a Heritage-listed wetland with rare bird species.

Currency Creek is home to the Currency Creek Eucalyptus Arboretum – the only place in the world where you can see more than 90 per cent of Australia's eucalypt species in one place (more than 8000 trees across 32 hectares).

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

MIDDLETON

81 kilometres from Adelaide

Although increasingly popular as a holiday destination, Middleton's smooth, open beaches still provide the sort of natural solitude that could turn anyone into a beachcomber. It's the "middle" town on the old railway line between Goolwa and Victor Harbor and now a thriving hamlet known for its bakery, cafés, holiday houses, bed and breakfasts, beach fishing and a rocky point that creates a good surfing break for Southern Ocean swells.

Middleton is a popular spot for enjoying the Encounter Bikeway – a shared, sealed coastal pathway that's at its most spectacular between Middleton and Port Elliot.

During the winter season (July to October) Southern Right whales come to the sheltered coves near Middleton to mate and calve, and can be spotted from Middleton Point or Bashams Beach which form part of the Encounter Marine Park.

PORT ELLIOT

85 kilometres from Adelaide

A big future was envisioned for Port Elliot when it was earmarked in 1854 as the major Encounter Bay outlet through which the rich agricultural bounty shipped down the Murray River would be exported. A battered breakwater is all that remains of the failed attempt to construct a safe shipping harbour but in its place is one of the sweetest beach settings in South Australia.

A caravan park, bowling green, public reserve and restaurant each claim the best position around Horseshoe Bay, which is protected by several little islands not far off shore where whale sightings are a regular attraction in winter. The town itself is a model seaside village, renowned for its cafés, pubs and retail shops along The Strand, its wide choice of accommodation, and a bakery which regularly draws queues.

With many historic local buildings, Port Elliot was the perfect choice to recreate 1960s Goolwa for the filming of the 2019 film Storm Boy.

Head for the train station to catch the Cockle Train to Goolwa or Victor Harbor, follow the Port Elliot Maritime Heritage Trail on the foreshore of Horseshoe Bay or explore vantage points such as Freemans Nob and the cliff top walking path for stunning views of the Encounter Bay coastline.

FLAVOURS OF FLEURIEU

McLAREN VALE & SURROUNDS

Ideally located between the hills and the coast, the fertile landscape surrounding **McLaren Vale** sees highly prized grape growing areas competing with the likes of dairy farmers and olive and almond growers, and visitors are the ones to benefit. You only need to call into the highly acclaimed farmers' market at **Willunga** to be spoiled with choices from the locally sourced goods, from seasonal fruit and vegetables to artisan breads, cheeses and condiments. Whether you

choose to pack your own picnic basket or dine at one of the many restaurants – there's no end to the delights on offer. The area may be steeped in history – the name says it all at **Old Noarlunga** and **Old Reynella** – but that doesn't stop the locals creating new and exciting experiences from helicopter rides to more down-to-earth bonding with nature. The wetland at **Mount Compass** offers a little oasis just off the main road. And, of course, all this is within minutes of the coast.

The Mediterranean climate that sustains the local produce makes this a perfect destination any time of year and the constantly changing colours of the landscape will always reward repeat visitors. Take time to meander the winding roads to visit the quaint hamlets of the area including **Kangarilla** and **Clarendon**. You'll need plenty of time to really appreciate what this region has to offer, so whether you're planning several day trips or to immerse yourself for a week, make sure it's on your to-do list.

McLAREN VALE

40 kilometres from Adelaide

Not only is **McLaren Vale** an internationally acclaimed wine district (see page 18) the town also offers beautiful scenery, with the surrounding vineyards changing colour with the seasons.

It is widely accepted that Thomas Hardy's purchase of the Tintara vineyard in 1853 marked the symbolic beginning of the town and today visitors can still experience the rich wine history of the area alongside the more recently added craft breweries and distilleries.

The McLaren Vale and Fleurieu Coast Visitor Centre, on the left as you take the turn off the main road, is a great place to start your visit. There you will find a wealth of information and advice plus an art gallery with changing exhibitions, café, wine tasting and a stock of locally-brewed beers.

You can wander the main street looking around the art studios, galleries and gift shops, but to get a feel of the countryside,

walk or ride the eight-kilometre Shiraz Trail beginning at the Visitor Centre and meandering through to the township of Willunga, passing through vineyards and wild olive groves. The area is full of local restaurants and cafés serving up delicious regional produce plus an extensive range of cellar doors.

While this area is close enough for a day trip from Adelaide, why wouldn't you take advantage of the wide range of accommodation options available to make the most of your visit?

On the road between McLaren Vale and Kangarilla, the **McLaren Flat** township is where the Adelaide Hills meet the vales. It is a renowned wine production area with many small family-owned wineries with cellar doors and delightful restaurants.

CLARENDON

28 kilometres from Adelaide

Follow the twists and turns of the road to discover this picturesque village in a deep valley which began as a fording point of the Onkaparinga River to connect Adelaide travellers with McLaren Vale, Meadows and Strathalbyn.

The surrounding hills contain remnants of old orchards and vineyards, including some of the state's most renowned shiraz, while the General Store is reputed to be the oldest in South Australia still operating in its original building. Other historic architecture dates from the mid-1880s with many of the town's original stone buildings having been gradually restored over the past few decades. The Clarendon Heritage Trail visits the original school, police station and courthouse.

The Riverbend Reserve is a much-loved picnic spot. Discover art works, antiques and modern vintage housed in a restored 1870's stone building before calling into the bakery.

KANGARILLA

33 kilometres from Adelaide

On the northern edge of the Peninsula close to the Adelaide Hills, Kangarilla is an outpost of the McLaren Vale wine growing area and home to several highly reputed wineries and vineyards.

Surrounded by many small farms, the historic township features several buildings of state and local historical significance dating back to the mid-1800s. Why not stop off for a barbecue amid century-old gum trees and enjoy the countryside while sheep graze nearby?

MOUNT COMPASS

58 kilometres from Adelaide

An authentic rural hub, and handy stop on the way to the coast, Mount Compass is surrounded by rolling hills, meandering country roads and agricultural farmland. Visit the Mount Compass Wetland, also part of the Hills Sculpture Trail, which provides a haven for wildlife. It's just behind the main shopping strip. Tee off at Mount Compass Golf Course, or pick up the Produce and Tourism Trail to really get to know the area.

Nearby the **Mount Jagged** area boasts views across the Central Mount Lofty Ranges to the coast as you travel through Hindmarsh Valley, where you will also find Hindmarsh Falls.

Leave the main Victor Harbor Road and head to **Nangkita** to explore beautiful valleys containing some of the Peninsula's loveliest country hamlets. Rolling hillsides surround small farms providing a variety of fresh produce much of which is often available at roadside stalls. If you want views, there's none better than on the road leading over Mount Magnificent to Kuitpo.

It was the local spring-fed creeks that gave the area around **Tooperang** its name, derived from an Aboriginal word for "much water". Follow Cleland Gully Road and the Tookayerta Creek east of Mount Compass as it winds through rolling hills and scrub where you can turn south on Deep Creek Road to reach Scott Conservation Park.

OLD NOARLUNGA

31 kilometres from Adelaide

Set on a bend of the Onkaparinga River, the village of Old Noarlunga became an important focus for local industry after it was founded in 1841 as an early trade route for locally milled flour taken to ships at Port Noarlunga. Now it is the centrepiece of Onkaparinga River National Park with boardwalk access to the estuary wetlands where birdwatchers can expect to see little egrets, coots, ibis, herons and Yellow-billed spoonbills. Take the self-guided tour of the town to catch its history, including the landmark St Phillip and St James churches. Other local historical features include the Market Square stockyard, steam driven flour mill, post office, blacksmith and milliner, while more contemporary comforts are on offer in local cafés and restaurants.

OLD REYNELLA

25 kilometres from Adelaide

Full of living history, **Old Reynella** offers walking and cycling, or you can simply relax by the picturesque creek or enjoy

a coffee. Look out for the restored historic cottages on Corn Street.

Nearby **Reynella** is home to the historic Hardy's vineyard where the first grape vines in South Australia were planted in 1838. The restored buildings of the Old Reynella Horse Changing Station now contain many interesting collections of historical artefacts, heritage information and photographs. Visit Panalatinga Creek which links up to the Coast to Vines Rail Trail.

WILLUNGA

47 kilometres from Adelaide

Established just three years after the settlement of South Australia and known for its almond trees, which are celebrated at the Almond Blossom Festival in late July, the most recent drawcard is the hugely popular Willunga Farmers' Market held every Saturday and providing a fine showcase of regional produce. Every second Saturday of the month, it is joined by the Willunga Quarry Market. The surrounding farmland originally supported wheat and mixed farming. Today

the fields are now more commonly full of vineyards, olives and almonds, of course.

In the mid-19th century slate mining was an early industry for the town – look out for the local roofs, footpaths, fences and bridges. The historic cottages built by the slate miners are still among the more interesting buildings to be seen in the area. The many fine old buildings dating back to the 1840s are a reminder of the region's rich history, including the National Trust's Slate Museum (in the former police stables), Old Courthouse and Police Station Museum and Bassett Boys' Schoolroom. The bell in St Stephen's Church is reputed to have been originally cast during the reign of Elizabeth I, and purists claim the repairs made necessary over time have left it with a flat tone.

Gardeners will appreciate the more than 1000 different varieties of roses on display in St Andrews Terrace while others will enjoy wandering the main street to explore the array of galleries, cafés, antique and curio shops, craft workshops and good coffee. Port Willunga, a popular swimming beach, is just 10 kilometres away.

SHARE THE BOUNTY

EASTERN FLEURIEU

Nestled between Lake Alexandrina to the east and the Fleurieu Coast to the west, this region offers a diverse range of experiences from exploring forests to sailing the freshwater lakes and wine tasting. Several small hamlets dot the scenic drives in the area so it's worth taking the time to explore. **Paris Creek** is now more associated with biodynamic dairy products than the original Paris family who settled the town in the 1860s. In the past, the town was renowned for its marble, which has been used in local public buildings, as well as the National War Memorial in Canberra.

Take the road from **Strathalbyn**, a larger rural town supporting primary producers and other industries, to **Ashbourne** and marvel at the winding avenue of grand old red gums – it's one of the most scenic strips of road in Fleurieu Peninsula. A small community nestled in a lovely valley at the intersection of Bull Creek and Finnis River, Ashbourne is famous for the fresh produce that can often be bought from roadside stalls. Its private golf course is a gem. Ashbourne sits just north of Cox Scrub Conservation Park, edged by Finnis River. The park contains many native animals such as the Southern Brown bandicoot, abundant birdlife

and wildflowers particularly the orchids in spring. Look out for the Indigenous canoe trees on the roadside as you head south to Goolwa via Currency Creek. Kuitpo Forest is a popular destination for camping, horse riding, bush walking, trail riding and, more recently, weddings. Vineyards planted around Kuitpo are starting to make a name for themselves but the Eastern Fleurieu is better known for the **Langhorne Creek** wine region. One of the oldest wine grape growing areas in Australia, here you will discover world-class wines in architecturally designed cellar doors offering a range of dining and tasting experiences.

STRATHALBYN

58 kilometres from Adelaide

Settled in 1839 by Scottish immigrants on the plains surrounding the Angas River at the base of the Southern Mount Lofty Ranges, **Strathalbyn** town now lies either side of the meandering Angas River with the Heritage-listed Soldiers Memorial Gardens at its heart. Stunning and peaceful throughout the year, this historic and picturesque settlement is renowned for its architecture, gardens and river walks. The Eastern gateway to Fleurieu Peninsula, Strathalbyn is only a short drive to the Murray River and Lower Lakes, Ramsar Wetlands, conservation parks and culturally significant sites. It also makes a handy base for exploring the coast, hills, wine country and the city.

Strathalbyn is the place to soak up history, architecture and beautiful gardens, while enjoying the vitality and ambiance of the town. Strathalbyn has a vibrant community with something for everyone, with a great range of accommodation, cafes, eateries,

art galleries, retail, a state-of-the-art library, playgrounds and an outdoor swimming pool. The historic Railway Station building houses the Visitor Information Centre and the Station Masters Art Gallery. Each month you can listen out for the horn and see the SteamRanger heritage train as it passes through town travelling between Victor Harbor and Mount Barker.

Promoting a thriving art and craft community with many shops and galleries exhibiting local artists' work, Strathalbyn is also known for a number of impressive antique shops.

Strathalbyn is home to one of the best country race tracks in South Australia and hosts many other equestrian events such as polo, camp drafting and harness racing.

LANGHORNE CREEK

78 kilometres from Adelaide

The cooling lake and ocean breezes (the locals call it the air conditioner) which give the highly acclaimed wine grapes grown around the township of **Langhorne Creek**

their distinctive character also provide the perfect environment for visiting the growing number of cellar doors or stopping for lunch at the local pub. You can read more on page 20.

Wine aside, the landscape is inspiring, with ancient gum trees and retired windmills that used to pump water, standing in the vineyards among rows of vines that date back more than 100 years. Langhorne Creek is home to the oldest family-owned cabernet vines in production in the world, located at the Metala Estate in Lake Plains.

TREAT YOUR TASTEBUDS

The cellar door at **Angas Plains Wines** in Langhorne Creek offers wine tasting sales, scones with all the trimmings and coffee. Why not stay for lunch and choose from dishes such as chunky steak and red wine pies, warm chicken salads or selection of pizzas?

MILANG

77 kilometres from Adelaide

In the late 19th century, **Milang** was the largest inland port in South Australia, providing a busy trade and produce hub for road transport from Melbourne. The paddle steamers are long gone, leaving Milang as a peaceful refuge with a laid-back lifestyle that suits visiting families, windsurfers, anglers or binocular-packing bird-watchers.

Set on the western shore of Lake Alexandrina, Milang has many charming old buildings, including a group of quirky heritage shacks on the foreshore. A heritage museum is housed in restored railway carriages still sitting on the tracks.

Milang is the only town situated on the shores of Lake Alexandrina – the nearby secluded town of **Clayton Bay** sits on an estuary and offers great camping, a restaurant café, boardwalk, boat ramp and mooring sites. The safe, sheltered waters provide a habitat for migratory birds and is the perfect place to learn how to sail.

WELLINGTON

108 kilometres from Adelaide

At the junction of the Murray River and Lake Alexandrina, **Wellington** is the gateway for visitors to Fleurieu Peninsula approaching from the west. Settled in 1838, it is one of the river's oldest towns and when a ferry service opened in 1846 it was for many years the only point where travellers could cross the river. Today a 24-hour ferry service is available. Wellington is home to quaint historic buildings including one of the state's oldest continually operating hotels, established in 1848.

OUR NEIGHBOURHOOD



Goolwa Beach

Experience the Murray Mouth on a cruise from Goolwa or drive along sealed roads to a viewing area at Sugars Beach on Hindmarsh Island. You can also take a 4WD vehicle along Goolwa Beach, but how close you get to the mouth will depend on the tide and river flows. Check the signs at Goolwa Beach car park before heading onto the beach.

The waters of Lake Alexandrina make up the largest body of fresh water in South Australia and flow into the Coorong, a protected coastal reserve. The Murray, Angas, Bremer and Finniss rivers all feed Lake Alexandrina. This area is a naturalist's haven, with the Lower Lakes, Murray Mouth and Coorong National Park listed as a Wetland of International Importance for Waterbirds. The best time to visit is in the spring or early summer, after the rains and the arrival of many hundreds of thousands of migratory Northern Hemisphere wader birds. You can swim, fish, cruise, ski or follow one of the three canoe trails which stretch more than 80 kilometres across the Coorong National Park. For more information, visit sa.canoe.org.au

Crossing by ferry at Wellington (see page 57) you can head north to explore more of the Murray River, or south past the lower lakes to experience more of the Coorong.

TAILEM BEND

Travelling from Adelaide, visitors will pass through Tailem Bend before taking either the coastal or inland route to the Limestone Coast. Perched on the clifftops, Tailem Bend overlooks the Murray River as it journeys towards the Lakes of Alexandrina and Albert. In the 19th century Tailem Bend was an important Railway Town, but today it is a commercial centre for the surrounding Mallee. It's also home to The Bend Motorsport Park.

Tailem Bend's most iconic building and strongest representation of railway history is the railway station, which today serves as the Visitor Information Outlet and home to the Tailem Rail Museum.

You can explore the area by taking one of the walking trails including the Tailem Bend Historic Rail Trail and River Bend Heritage Trail, or head out on the water on the Lower Murray Canoe Trail.

MENINGIE

Nestled near the tranquil waters of Lake Albert, Meningie is the northern gateway to the Coorong and Limestone Coast. Meningie was established as a staging post and service centre for surrounding graziers.

Serviced by paddle steamers from Milang, it formed part of the original Adelaide to Melbourne coastal route used by the early stagecoaches. Fishing, boating, skiing, walking trails and fabulous sunsets await visitors to this idyllic country town. A short walk to Meningie Hill Lookout provides views over Lake Albert and the surrounding pastoral properties, while a wetland bird sanctuary is a haven for the many birds seen in the Coorong.

The Meningie Cheese Factory Museum showcases memorabilia and historic displays, and the Chambers is home to Coorong Cottage Industries which offers a wide selection of arts, crafts and local produce.

The Pelican Path (Yunti Ngopun Ngami – the Ngarrindjeri phrase for "Together We Walk") captures the 400-metre interpretive path along the waterfront which highlights the European, Aboriginal and environmental history of the Meningie region, basket weaving and fish trap inlays and architecturally designed viewing platforms.

While strolling down the waterfront you'll see the iconic Birdman Ostrich sculpture – it's for you to sit on and take a photo!

RAUKKAN/NARRUNG PENINSULA

Explore the Narrung Peninsula and discover Point Malcolm Lighthouse located opposite

Narrung on the Narrows (between the two lakes). Built in 1878 this is Australia's only inland lighthouse.

A little further on, situated on the lands of the Ngarrindjeri people, Raukkan is the birthplace of David Unaipon, the inventor and author whose image, along with the mission church of Raukkan, appears on the \$50 note. Built in 1869, the restored church is still in use today. Internationally renowned artist Guido van Helten (Brim silo, Coonalpyn silos) recently painted the walls of Moorundi (Raukkan's Aboriginal Community Controlled Health Service).





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FINDING YOUR WAY AROUND FLEURIEU PENINSULA



Rapid Bay

Just an hour's drive from Adelaide sees you in the centre of Fleurieu Peninsula, where you'll find everything within easy reach. Experience several wine regions, including McLaren Vale and Langhorne Creek, fresh produce from the farm gate, world-class art galleries, some of the state's most beautiful beaches and an inspiring coastline.

By car

From Adelaide, travel via Main South Road (B23) or take the more direct Southern Expressway (M2). These two roads will bring you to the Fleurieu Coast and continuing on Main South Road will take you all the way to Cape Jervis, the departure point of the Kangaroo Island ferries. Alternatively, turn off onto Victor Harbor Road (A13), to head to McLaren Vale and the South Coast. Otherwise, access the region via the South Eastern Freeway (M1). Either take the B33 turn-off at Stirling for the scenic route to Strathalbyn or, for a more direct route, take the B37 through Mount Barker. If travelling north-west along the Princes Highway (A1), you can take the vehicle ferry at Wellington.

By plane

Fleurieu Peninsula has airstrips in Aldinga and Goolwa for use by private and charter aircraft. Adelaide Airport is located 15 minutes from the Adelaide CBD.

By coach

A number of bus and coach operators run regular services from Adelaide to towns on Fleurieu Peninsula. South Australia's public transport system, Adelaide Metro, also operates a service from Adelaide to McLaren Vale and Strathalbyn. For more information, phone 1300 311 108. There are morning and afternoon coach connections between Adelaide and Cape Jervis to meet the Kangaroo Island ferry, with stops at Aldinga, Goolwa, Myponga, Yankalilla, Normanville, Second Valley and Victor Harbor.

By train

Adelaide Metro operates a regular commuter train service between Adelaide and Seaford. Visit adelaidemetro.com.au for more information. For something a little more leisurely, take the SteamRanger Heritage Railway which travels between Mount Barker and Victor Harbor. You can also travel aboard the historic Cockle Train between Goolwa, Port Elliot and Victor Harbor.

GETTING AROUND

The region offers a network of well-maintained roads linking its many villages and townships. Distances are fairly short by Australian standards, but the roads are

often used by tractors and other agricultural machinery, so allow plenty of time.

2WD and 4WD

Standard 2WD vehicles are suitable for most of the region, but if you are planning on driving on beaches such as Moana, Silver Sands, Sellicks Beach or Aldinga you may need a 4WD. A 4WD vehicle is essential to drive on Goolwa Beach.

Some sections in Deep Creek Conservation Park are also restricted to 4WD vehicles. Check signage and conditions prior to entry.

Touring the region

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
