There's so much to love about Lake Macquarie it's sometimes hard to know where to start. So why not here, with our top 20 highlights? These suggestions are sure to kick start your holiday and help you discover all that our beaches, Lake and mountains have to offer. Happy exploring!

### 1. Catherine Hill Bay



A historic mining village and picturesque beach, twice named one of Australia's '101 Best Beaches'.

### 5. Blacksmiths Beach



A top swimming beach, protected by a breakwall offering excellent views and fishing access to Swansea Channel.

### 9. Belmont Foreshore



Belmont's leafy foreshore is great place to catch the sunset. Dine at one of the waterfront sailing clubs or go for a lake swim at Belmont Baths.

### 13. Warners Bay



This lively lakeside town is full of life, m its well-established dining scer to a bustling foreshore with bike hire and eye catching public art.

### 17. Rathmines Park



Formerly home to the largest seaplane base in the Southern Hemisphere during WWII, now a peaceful place to relax by the Lake.

## How to get to Lake Macquarie

### by road

The M1 Pacific Motorway links Sydney with Lake Macquarie, For East Lake Macquarie, take the 'Doyalson, Swansea' exit. For West Lake Macquarie, you can use the Morisset, Toronto or Cardiff exits. If arriving from the north, follow the Pacific Highway through Charlestown onwards.

### by air

The closest airport is Newcastle Airport, located at Williamtown, 40 minutes from northern Lake Macquarie. From here, transport options include rental cars, public buses, taxis or Uber. Contact 02 4928 9822 or visit newcastleairport.com.au.

### by rail

Sydney Trains on the Newcastle and Central Coast line. Major stations in Lake Macquarie include Wyee, Morisset, Fassifern and Cardiff. NSW TrainLink trains stop at Fassifern station. Contact 131 500 or visit transportnsw.info.

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


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
