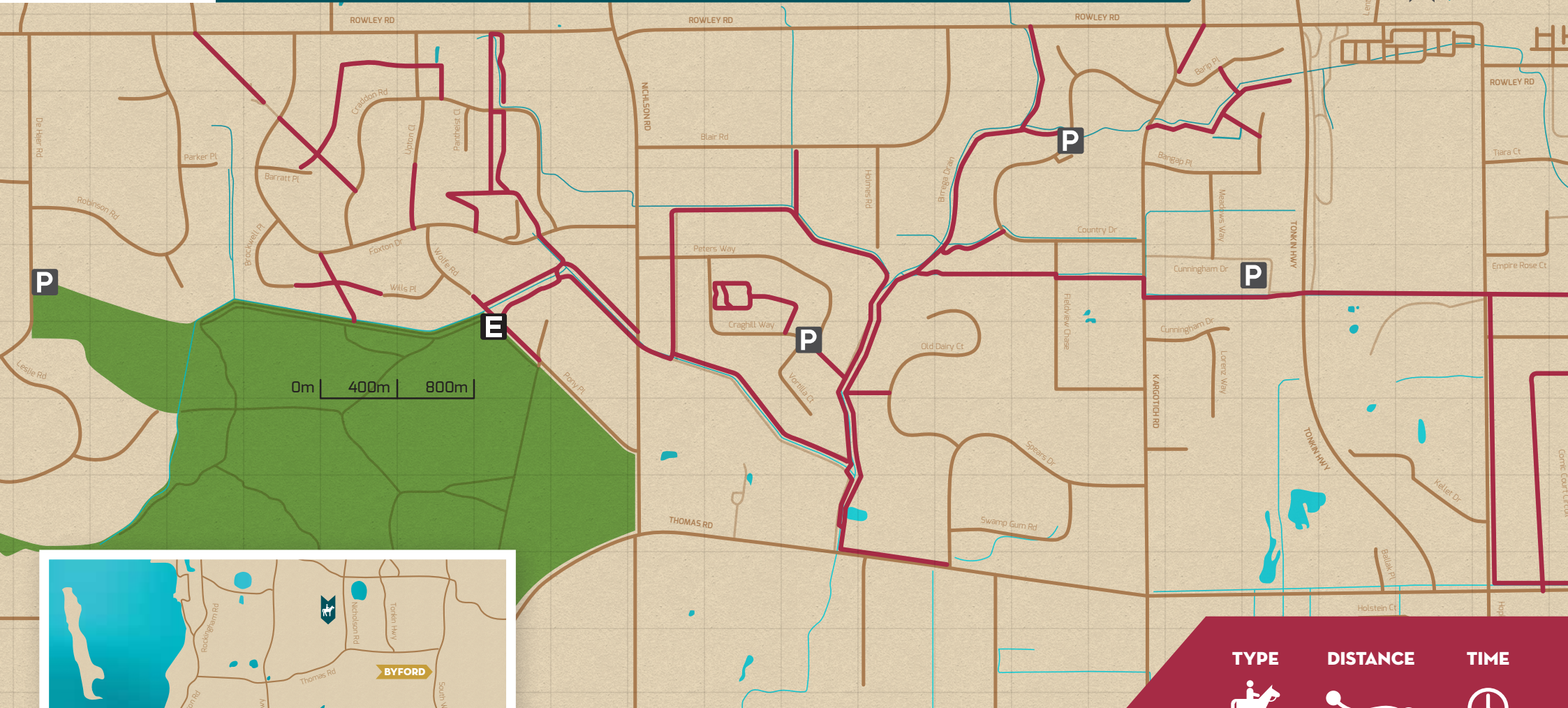




OAKFORD BRIDLE TRAILS

GETTING THERE

The boundaries of the Oakford Trails stretches from Rowley Rd in the north, to the Tonkin Highway in the east, through to Thomas Rd and Anketell Rd in the south and De Haer Rd in the west.

Your final parking destination will depend on how you get to each of these locations.

FACILITIES

Over 20kms of trails in the Oakford area with an additional 13kms to be found in the Jandakot Regional Park.

Apart from the trails themselves, there are no additional facilities in this area.

FLOAT PARKING

No official parking has been created in this area, however there are several areas to park a couple of floats.

1. Country Drive - On the side of the road, near the bridge, up to 4 floats can park safely.
2. Cunningham Drive - Off Kargotich Road, the northern section ends in a cul de sac with room for a couple of floats.
3. Corner Craighill Way and Peters Way - At the end of Craighill Way with room for a couple of floats.

If you are accessing the Oakford Trails from the Jandakot Regional Park, there is float parking at the Magenupe Equestrian Centre, off De Haer Road

TRAIL INFORMATION

Many of the local roads are quiet and can be used to create additional loops that suit you.

Please be very careful when riding along Kargotich Rd as it can be quite busy.

Please note that step-overs have been created at the entrances to the Jandakot Regional Park to stop motorbike access. This is located along the limestone portion of Pony Plc approximately 390m to the west of the bitumen from the Nicholson Rd access.

The surfaces of the trails vary and include sand, limestone and compacted trotting fines.

POINTS OF INTEREST

Many trails are located right next to the **Birrega Drain**. This drain is managed by the Water Corporation and was used to drain the land to reduce inundation on properties and improve primary production in the Peel Catchment.

Jandakot Regional Park - Comprised of almost 3000ha of land, from small to large reserves, and provides important refuge for native plants and animals as urban sprawl increase pressure on our environment. Vegetation varies from wetlands through to Banksia woodlands.

The portion of Park included in this map, in which horses are allowed to be ridden, is known as Anketell North and consists of over 370ha of native vegetation.

Additional trails - There is a direct link through to the Darling Downs Bridle trails, adding 20kms to your riding experience. The ultimate goal is to have riding access from Wandi all the way through to the Wungong Regional Park in the hills.

CODE OF PRACTICE

BE SAFE

Riders should consider safety matters when riding the bridle trails in the Serpentine Jarrahdale Shire, and should;

- Wear approved safety helmet
- Be aware of the hazards of riding in very hot weather. Make sure water is available for both horse and rider if on a long ride, and ensure there are plenty of shady rest spots to get out of the hot sun.
- Familiarise themselves with plants in the area so that they can recognise plants which may possible be poisonous to horses, or which are endangered species. Avoid grazing horses if you are not sure of the plants identity.
- Avoid riding in times of high fire danger, for your own safety if there is a fire.

BE COURTEOUS

- Avoid riding on private land. If unsure of land ownership do not access.
- When using gates, follow the golden rule - Leave gates as you found them - If they are closed, close them after passing through, and if they are already open, leave them open.
- When riding on or near public trotting and racing tracks, give way to the horses already working there. Work on the same rein (in the same direction) as those already using the track.
- Avoid damage to the environment, particularly around drains and creek beds.
- Do not tie your horse to trees, especially if they are known to ringbark the trees.
- Observe local rules and public notices.
